bid to show the strength of his hand, Many bridge players are confused by the term "reverse" bidding, It should be simple. If you hold both hearts and diamonds and wish to bid both softs, you would normally bid hearts first and diamonds second. Therefore, if you bid diamonds first

North makes use of the "reverse"

and hearts second you have "reversed" the normal order A reverse bid shows longer diamonds thus hearts and a hand of about 18 high cards points

Actually, on these cards North could make a Jump shift if he didn't think that his partner would notice the reverse. Once North jumps or reverses (whichever he chooses), South should investigate slam. He has the kings of North's suit plus a stopper in clubs.

At rubber bridge, South should with for six diamonds, which is the safest contract. At duplicate, South will head for six no trump to get a maximum wore.
