At Monday evening's regular meeting, Nassagaweya Council:

Later trustee Ernie Bodnar informed the Board the "little bit of money" Mr. Goodin was speaking of would amount to \$900,000 a year if all Halton County students received free milk. The matter was dropped. Only those willing to pay for it will drink milk at school, this year anyway. .
