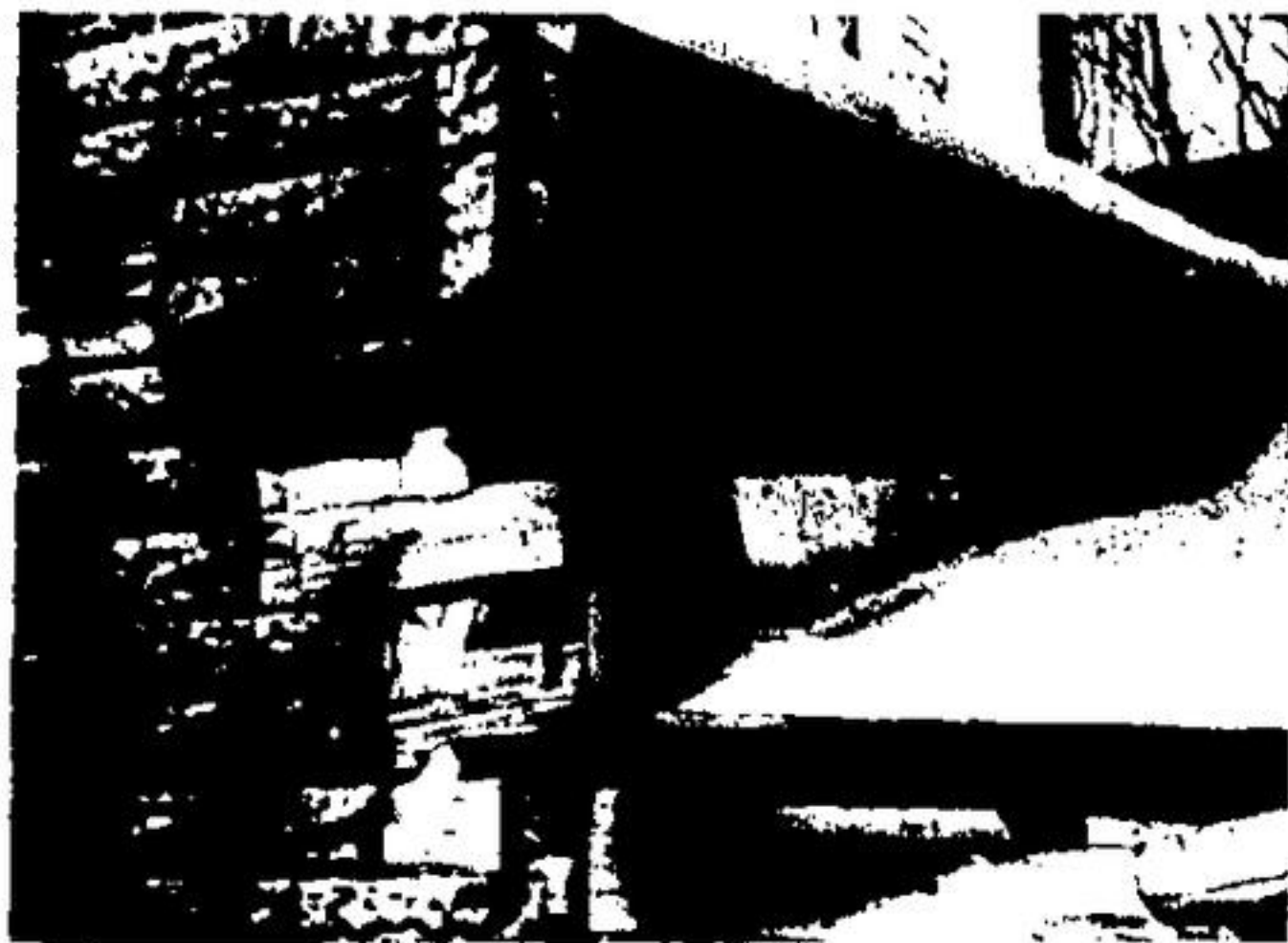




Museum preserves century-old cabin

GEORGETOWN — A car rally which was run through the Brampton-Georgetown area two weeks ago by Sheridan College could damage that school's image, according to a member of the board of governors.

To win the rally the navigator in each car had to drink a pint of beer at seven different stops. H. H. Hinton of Acton, a board member, said other colleges in Ontario have organized car rallies which are more dignified.

Defending the event, Paul Donoghue, president of Sheridan's student union said 46 teams entered the rally and 46 completed it "without incident."

Worry about arena

ELORA — Elora's consulting engineers will be asked to report on the condition of the structure of the Elora Community centre.

A councillor says he has been bombarded over the past few weeks by citizens worried about the safety of their children within the structure.

The arena which was built a little over 30 years ago has been closed on three occasions over the past two winters on the orders of the town building inspector.

Originally designed as a natural ice building, the installation of artificial ice has prevented the roof warming up on mild days so that snow can slide off. This resulted in heavy buildups of snow that twisted and shifted the main support trusses. Although they were braced several years ago shifting still occurs. The trusses now fail to straighten out completely when the snow is removed.

Council ruled it wise to consult engineers before the Elora Lions Club proceeds with re-roofing the south side this spring.

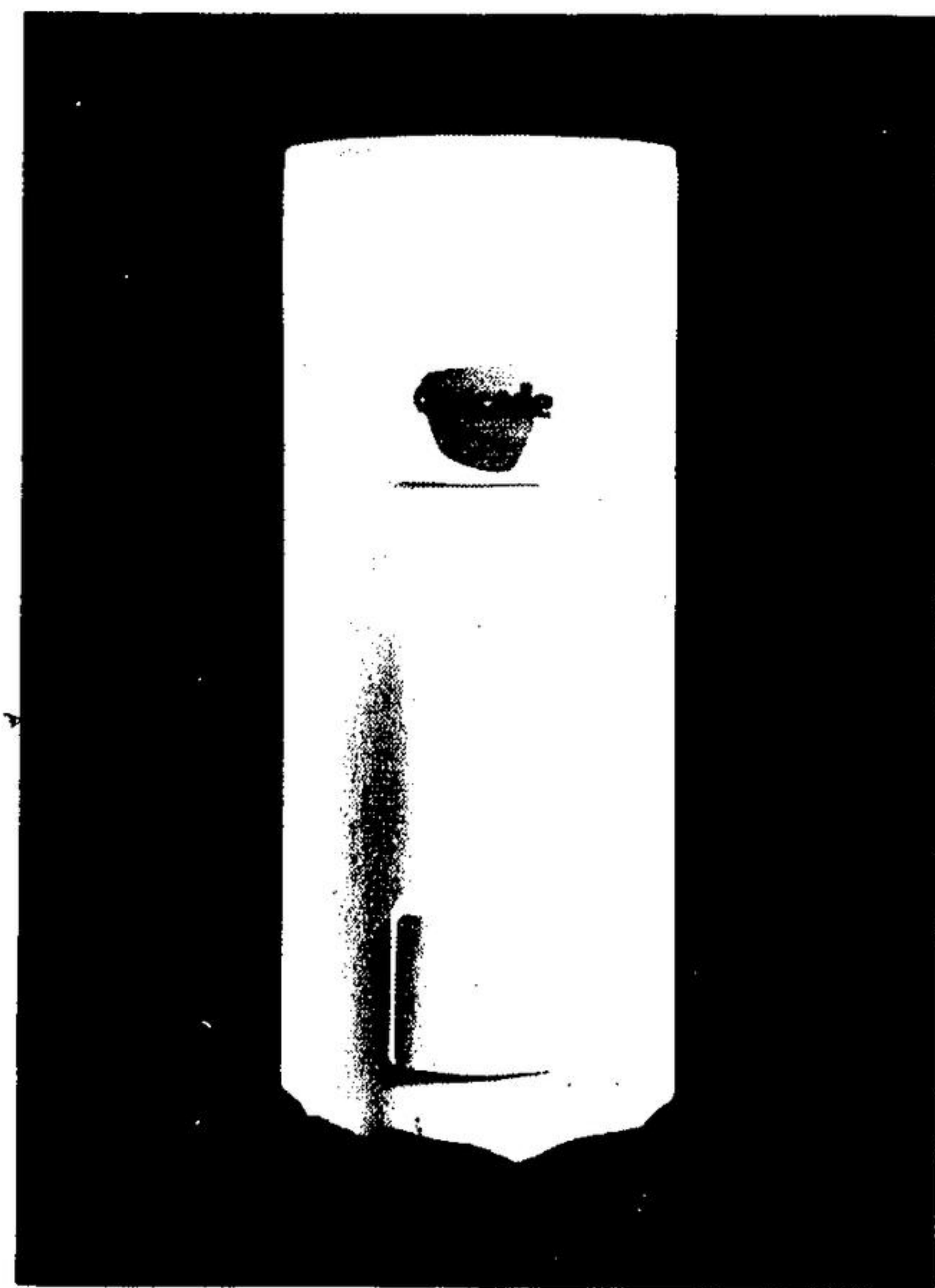

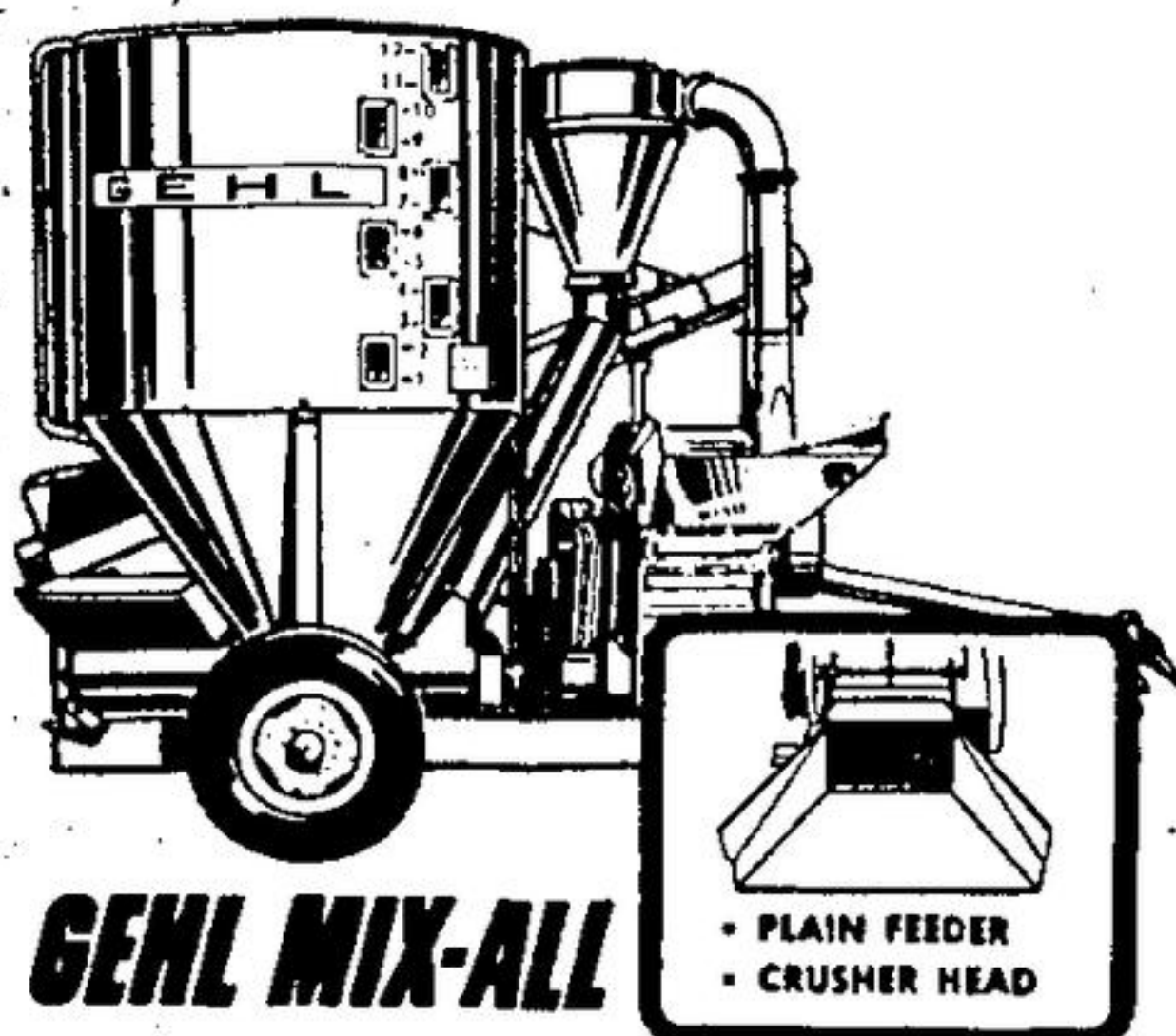
