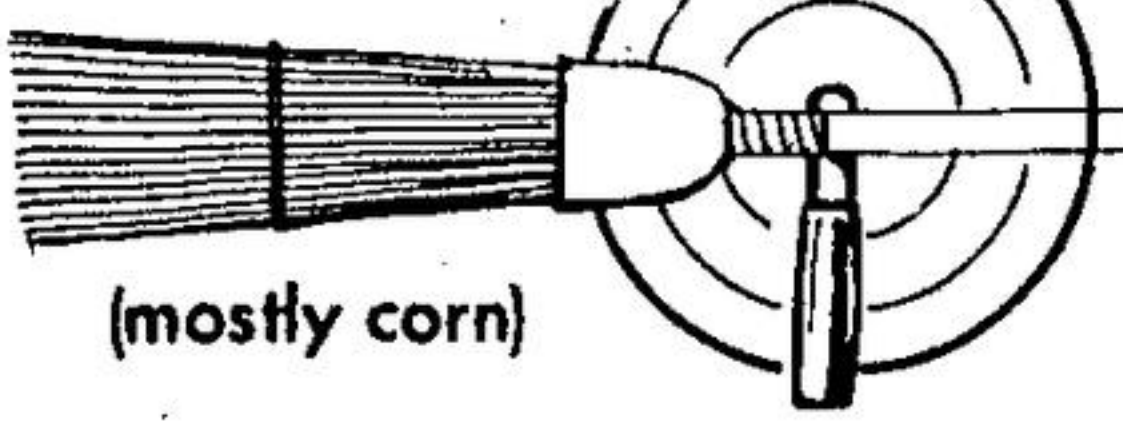


Wi' Rock and Broom

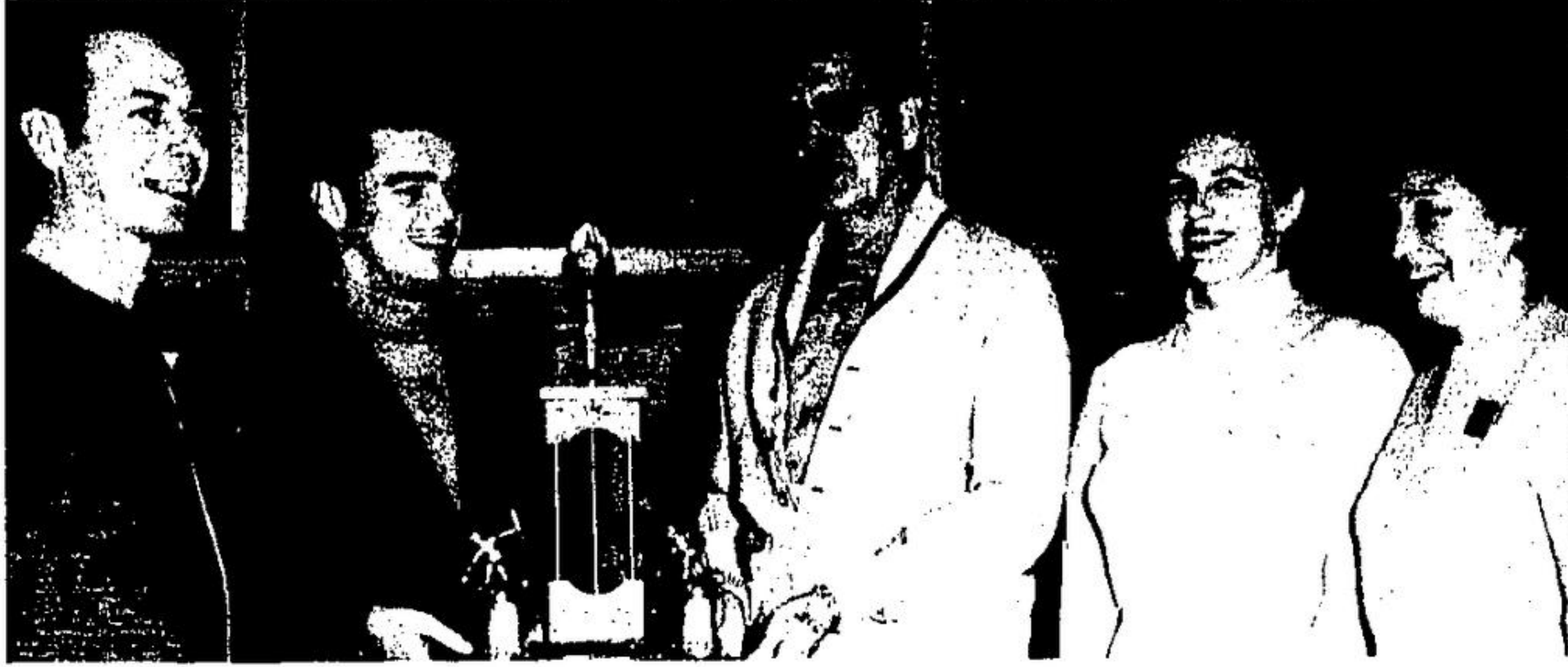
