Different little world of directories

Telephone directories in many cases have their own distinctive trademark. Many are vastly different from ours.

Take Copenhagen's directory, for example. Since there are more than 20,000 Hansens logged in the book, the telephone company has taken to listing their occupations beside their names. Hence, for the sake of clarity, you get Garderobedame (cloakroom attendant) Hansen, Grossere (wholesaler) Hansen and so on. (Acton has two Hansens.)

In London, the world's second-largest city the telephone listings are divided, by necessity, into four separate books. A government plan to break the listings into 36 individual directories was rejected last year. Israel - with two million citizens - has just one book for the entire nation, printed both in Hebrew and English.

Some directories contain novel features to offset their endless lists of names. The Bogota (Colombia) book features the full United Nations Declaration of Universal rights. In Colombo (Ceylon), the directory gives pointers and helpful hints toward better farming. The Jamaican telephone book contains a short history of the island, including Christopher Columbus' contribution (he discovered it).

Disgruntled taxpayers or demagogues can also use their directories to get to the top - in a hurry. Queen Elizabeth's number in London is 930-4832. If you'd like a telephone audience with the Pope, you might try the Vatican at 6982. (Obviously, in all cases, there is no guarantee that the eminent party you're calling will immediately rush to the phone).

And if you don't bother to use your directory at all - which seems unlikely during the course of a year - perhaps you can find your own novel application: somewhat like the shaky Latin American dictator, who, in a moment of furtive nail-biting, lined his bullet-proof railroad car with a generous supply of directories. To avoid close calls, no doubt.

Going up

Instruction costs over \$25 million

Officials expect the elementary school instructional cost for Halton County Board of Education to reach \$13,461,685 in 1970, or about 12 per cent higher than last year's instruction budget for elementary schools. Instruction costs for secondary schools are expected to reach \$11,546,428 for 1970.

Trustee Liberty Pease told the Board "recently—the hike is due to increased costs and growth in the system. Instructional costs are up \$1,512,677 on the secondary level.

Mr. Pease noted that while the costs for elementary students were up from \$594 to \$640 per pupil per year, the cost per pupil per day is still only \$3.20. He added, "That would only buy part of a piano lesson." Director Jim Singleton agreed it was necessary to look at the cost per pupil rather than the staggering totals in round numbers to get a realistic idea of the expenditures.

Mr. Pease noted some variations might be expected in salaries as those in the budget were only estimates. Teacher salaries are not yet settled.

Computer at Burlington

An expenditure of \$82,000 was approved at a meeting of Halton County School Board Thursday for a "small to medium" instructional computer system for Burlington's Lord Elgin High School.

It is likely the Board will purchase an IBM 1130 model. It was one of five considered. Those considered ranged in price from \$80,000 to \$145,000 and maintenance costs were estimated from a low of \$2,161 to \$7,448.

A committee including administration, instructors and

trustees was formed to decide which computer to get. Computers have been in use in Halton for three years. They hope to accommodate 800 students and the delegation of educators making the presentation to the board suggested growth trends indicate this level would be reached in three years.

The computer classes will be available not only to Burlington but also students across the county and a courier service will transport computer students to Lord Elgin.

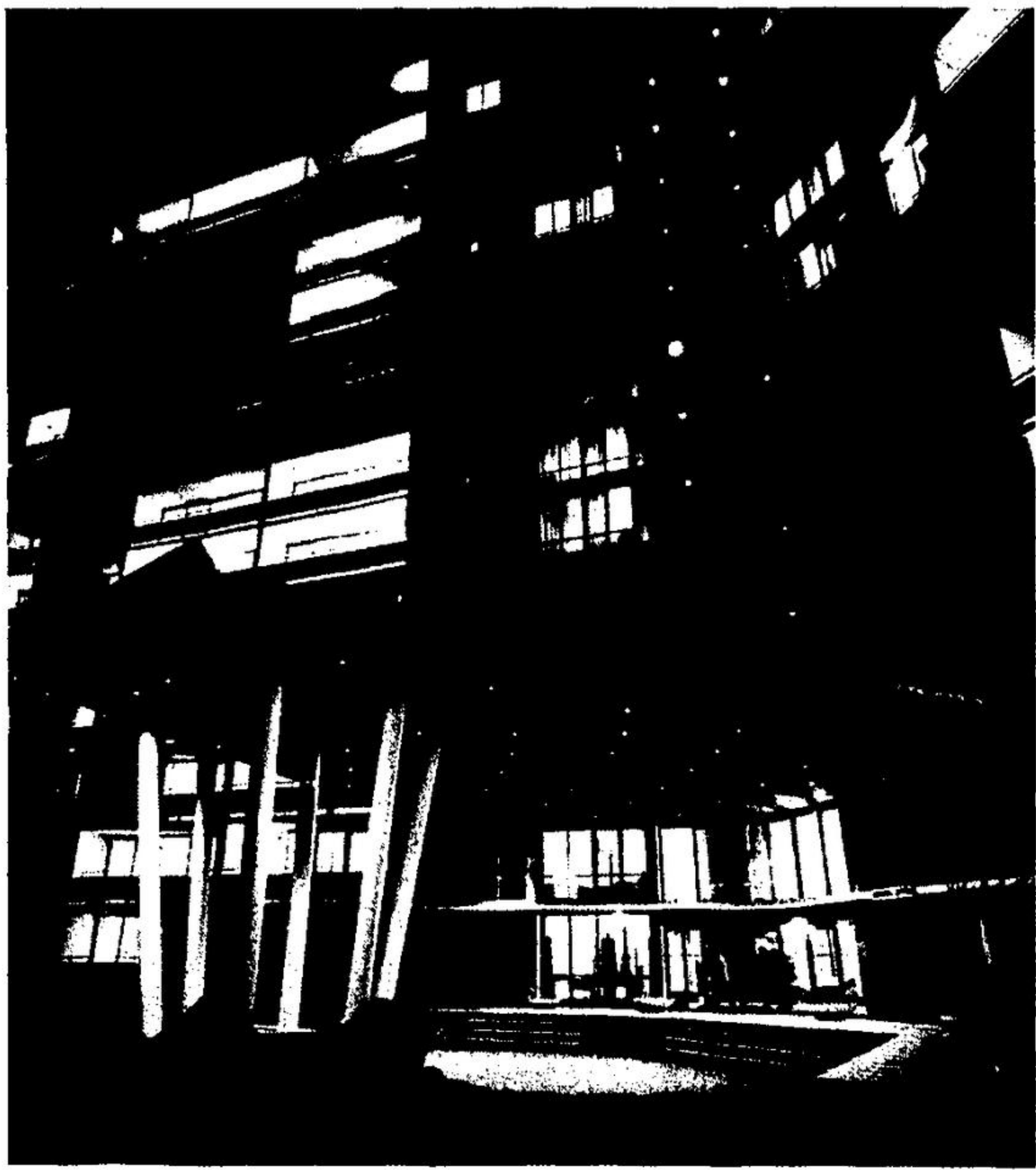
