During a regular meeting of Nassagaweya Township Council Monday members:

\* Granted a 90 day extension for the resurveying work being carried out in the Village of Campbellville. A report from the Village Trustees noted the work had been delayed by weather conditions.

\* Received the Halton Region Conservation Authority brief in reply to the Steele Commission report on the Burlington-Hamilton-Wentworth area. The Authority report suggested transfer of Burlington to the Hamilton area would jeopardize the watershed work. It recommended Burlington be left in the Halton Authority.

\* Learned the OPP detachment was operating a special patrol on trucks to insure compliance with the requirements to cover and secure loads.

\* Learned \$1,178 worth of hunting licenses had been sold in 1969-70.

\* Accepted the tender for gravel from Holman Construction Ltd., Rockwood at \$1.12 per cubic yard. The tender was the lowest of two received.
