Predicts death
of CORDC

Councillor Gibson said interest was lagging in the group. "It's unfortunate but in the areas CORDC serves no one wants to listen."

Guelph mayor asks for 'GO'

The proposed discontinuation of the CN train commuter service between Guelph and Toronto has drawn a suggestion from Guelph mayor Ralph Smith that the railway approach Queen's Park with a request to extend the province's "GO" train service to Guelph.

The mayor fired off a letter to the Railway Transport Committee asking if the railway had spoken to Queen's Park about replacing the present train unit with a "GO" service. He asked that the "GO" train replace the present service and also that the present trains not be abandoned until the "GO" train is prepared to take over immediately.

The present commuter trains stop at all stations, including Acton and Georgetown, both of whom have registered objections to discontinuance of the service. Brampton has also objected.

The mayor felt the CN was, in this case, in the same position as the city of Guelph whereby "we feel we must provide some type of in-the-city transportation service (bus) with a dollar loss figure attached to it as a public necessity".

Mayor Smith said this would mean some subsidization as a public requirement.

Since Guelph is on the main CNR line Mayor Smith said he could not agree to having a public service "dry up" on a main line. He said there is a certain degree of responsibility to provide some type of service on such a main line.

From his own observations, the mayor wondered if it would not be possible for the CN to run a five or six car train between Guelph and Toronto, with the train kept in Guelph overnight.

He also wondered if it would be possible for a two or three or four-car railiner set-up to be used in place of the train, adding "it would be interesting to see the cost of operation of these two types of railway and staff equipment."

OK rezoning at Brookville for 155-lot subdivision

Reeve A. MacArthur broke a tie vote at Nassagaweya Township Council Monday to move rezoning of a 95 acre parcel at Brookville a step ahead. The parcel is designed to accommodate 155 lots for future development and is located south and west of the Township offices with access from the Guelph Line.

Council acted against a recommendation of the Township Planning Board that had earlier declared the proposal premature.

Councillor A. Ackman pressed for further time to consider the proposal for rezoning and refused to cast a vote on the issue. Abstention from voting was ruled as a vote in the affirmative and this, with the vote of Councillor A. Gibson produced the two vote support. Deputy Reeve G. Agnew and Councillor J. Watson opposed the rezoning request. The reeve broke the tie in the affirmative.

Michael P. Brodigan represented Brookville Estates with unnamed principals. He stressed to council that he could understand immediate development might be premature but he could see no problem in setting aside lands for future development.

Mr. Brodigan noted his clients were also developers of the project at Moffat where a

159-lot subdivision has received draft plan approval and tentative Health Unit approval.

Deputy Reeve Agnew declared his opposition to the rezoning of lands at Brookville. "The minute we rezoned the land we increase its value and make it speculative, and I'm against that".

Reeve MacArthur pointed out she had differed with the Planning Board on its decision because she felt the township's Official Plan gave the right for development in the village areas. She observed she had not supported the Official Plan. She felt, however, the firm had purchased the land in good faith and the council had passed the official plan in good faith. "If I had purchased the land I would have felt the by-law said it would be rezoned", she concluded.

The Planning Board motion rejecting the rezoning application noted the township presently had some 500 lots available for development and further lots were not considered necessary.

Councillor Ackman suggested that if the township didn't want development of Brookville the area should have been deleted from the Official Plan.

Asked why his firm wanted rezoning now when it was not intended to proceed with development for five years, Mr.

Brodigan cited the need for long-range plans by developers. He suggested it was not practical to hold land for long terms unless there was some vested interest such as the correct zoning.

Deputy Reeve Agnew declared granting the rezoning would be setting a precedent and the decision of the Planning Board should carry some weight.

The preparation of a by-law to change land from rural A and V zones to VR was approved.
