

support for rezoning sought by a developer when the Planning Board had suggested the move was premature. He was also critical of the release of Planning Board studies on the proposed hydro route through the township, while the Board was seeking adoption of an alternative plan.

Board chairman Gordon ng ew set the tone for discussion at the meeting two nights after the Council meeting, when he reported calls from individual members and one member's threat to resign. "I've been accused of not keeping tight enough rein so the honeymoon is over", he told members. He reiterated his Monday night opposition to the release of the Hydro report.

"The Planning Board is not a secret society. It's a public meeting", Councillor Allan Ackman declared, defending his release of the report on the hydro route which had been proposed and the alternatives suggested by the Board. "I can't see how the information being available is considered a break of trust", he observed.

Chairman Agnew pointed out the board was negotiating with a large company trying to make a better deal for the people of the township. He noted Hydro had been appreciative of the board efforts and should have been given a little more time to report their views on the alternative proposals advanced by the Councillor Ackman suggested

the discussions were not negotiations. "They presented their proposal and we presented ours". He maintained that "when it affects the public they have a right to know."

Reeve A. MacArthur told board members she felt she had no right to silence anyone at the township council meeting. She suggested she did not feel Hydro would be antagonized. "I wouldn't want to feel we had to live in fear of a public body", she declared.

Councillor Ackman concluded the public now knows what is going on and maintained no negotiations were upset, "If they (Hydro) decide to take a route, they'll take it no matter, what we

Planning Board members were also upset at the council approval to seek rezoning to permit a 150 lot subdivision at Brookville, despite the Planning Board recommendation such a plan was premature.

The council vote on the issue was confused when Councillor Ackman refused to register his vote. His abstention was ruled in the affirmative, resulting in a tie vote on the rezoning request. Reeve MacArthur broke the tie by supporting the move. Pat Redgrave noted Councillor

Ackman had asked the vote be deferred "and it would have been in the ultimate interests of the township to defer", he suggested.

Reeve MacArthur noted the discussions had been going on since December and she felt it was time for the township to make a decision. She also observed the cheque accompanying the developer's application had been cashed. She suggested this indicated some

The clerk-treasurer pointed out it was normal practise to deposit such cheques.

Councillor Ackman noted he asked deferrment of the vote because he was of mixed feelings. He accepted the Planning Board view there were

already 500 separated lots in the township and more would be premature. He also felt, however, the Official Plan

encouraged development of the

developers. Since he had not

resolved the two issues he asked

the deferral. Chairman Gordon Agnew noted the by-law for rezoning would be coming to council and the planning board could object to the rezoning at the O.M.B.

Reeve MacArthur acknowledged she never voted for the Official Plan but felt as reeve she had to support it. "We can't keep everyone out of this blessed township", she declared. She agreed she would go along with no subdivisions if council would make it possible for buyers to have one acre lots elsewhere in the township. She declared this a better way to develop the township. She suggested the Official Plan was in reverse and maintained it should allow ribbon development rather than subdivisions.

Board member Smith declared he would support the move to no subdivisions in the township.


