## Display scrapbooks in public library

Two bulky scrapbooks, the result of a year's work by the

Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau, are presently on display to the public at Acton Public Library.

The two books total 218 pages and include minutes of meetings, copies of press releases, newspaper clippings, literature samples and photos of the bureau's activities in 1969. The scrapbooks were compiled by Public Relations Officer Roy Downs of Milton and submitted to the National Fire Protection Association's annual competition in Boston, where judges awarded the Halton Bureau a certificate of "special recognition" for an outstanding year-round fire prevention program.

Fire Chief Mick Holmes of Acton, the 1970 Bureau chairman, reports the Bureau will circulate the scrapbooks around the county's libraries in the next few months, to give the public a chance to see the Bureau's program.

## 1000 days of safety for area hydro staff

Despite the need to work in all kinds of weather and under emergency conditions, the staff of Ontario Hydro's Guelph Operating Area have completed 1000 days without a lost time accident. The occasion was marked by a presentation to the staff of a certificate of merit last Friday.

The 55 members of the staff were congratulated by W. J. Jackson, regional manager, at a short ceremony.

Commenting on the achievement, Stan Roslyn, area manager, said "Working safely is a state of mind and a lot of credit for our safety record must go to the members of our Safety Committee but in the final analysis, each member of the staff has contributed to the record by working to the established safety practices."

The Guelph Area staff serves over 10,000 rural customers in Wellington and Waterloo Counties as well as a few customers in Halton County. In addition they maintain service to the municipalities, these counties including Kitchener, Waterloo, Guelph, and Galt.
