Main St. rewiring in Hydro's budget

At the recent Hydro Commission meeting held at the Rockwood Town Hall Hydro accounts were passed totalling \$4,809.54 with the capital expenditures budget of \$13,600 for 1970 and '71 showing a drop of \$1,400 from the previous schedule.

Included in the capital budget among other items, was the re-wiring of Main Street from the tracks to the north end of the village which was necessary due to loose, bare, and ragged lines being a detriment in inclement weather, and a power line to the well located behind the Brandco building on Main Street.

During the war years Miss McLean joined the Wrens, and at the conclusion of the war took a course sponsored by the Services in food preparation and nutrition which she later put to practice in her work at the Homewood Sanitarium in Guelph and also the Guelph General Hospital.

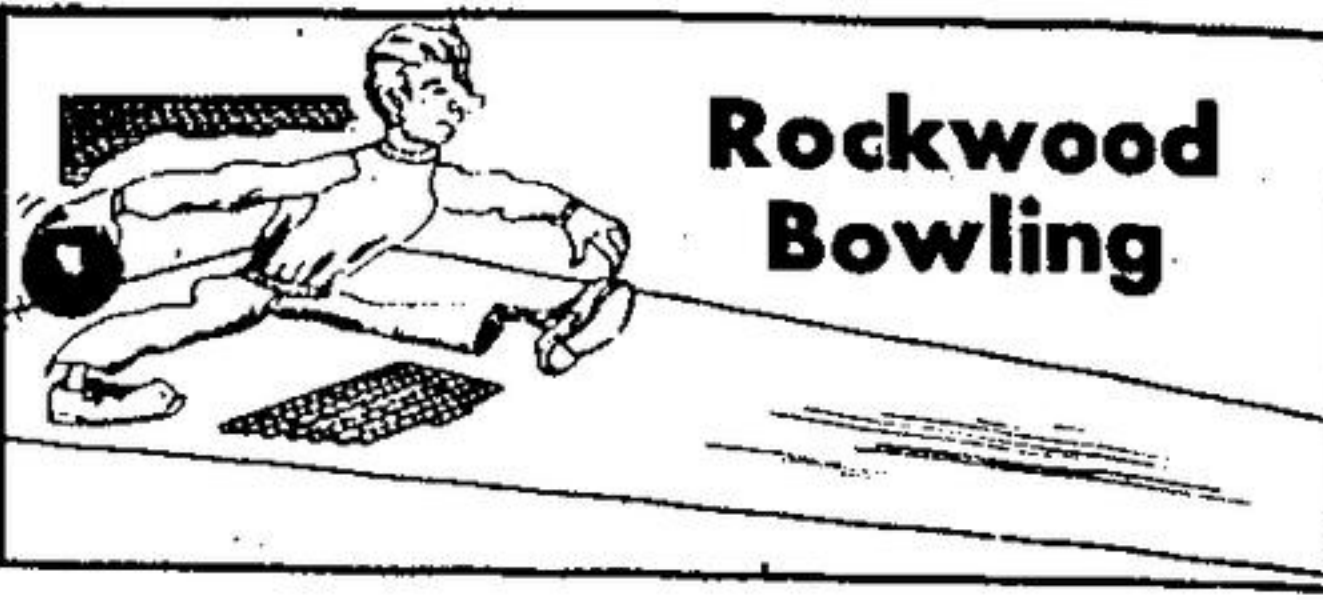

Two mill drop in '70 budget

A two mill drop in the 1970 budget was determined and discussed at the village trustee meeting held last Thursday evening at the Rockwood Town Hall at which chairman Ken Murray presided with trustees, Lloyd Waddell, Bert Smith and secretary Chas. O'Brien present.

The drop was due mainly to the finality of payments being made to cover costs for the 1969 purchase of a garbage van and garage.

The general meeting covered several motions pertaining to the village which were discussed and tabled accordingly. One particular item on the agenda referred to the necessity of dog control in which it is specified that all dogs must be controlled at all times with license fee dates having expired after January 1, 1970, and for which owners of animals running loose will be charged pound fees and, after June 30 a double license fee plus pound fees.

The trustee board unanimously agreed to request that by-laws be passed by township council for presentation to the Municipal Board as to whether new water and sewage costs can be handled adequately by the village residents and if passed the rates will be introduced at a public meeting.

Accounts were passed with roads \$405.85, and village costs \$986.52, totalling \$1,392.37. The meeting was then adjourned.
