## 57 nurses still plan to resign

Milton hospital board held a five and a half hour meeting last night (Tuesday) with representatives of the OHSC, discharged former director of nursing Mrs. L. Verrall and a representative of the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario present for part of the time but re-affirmed their decision not to re-hire Mrs. Verrall as director and assistant Mrs. P. Walker.

Four of the 61 registered nurses whose resignations were submitted to the board last week have withdrawn their resignations, but 57 have indicated they will carry out their threat and resign April 24 unless the two women are re-instated.

Milton hospital has been "grey-listed" by the Registered Nurses Association "until the situation is resolved".

Asked what the board would do if and when the nurses stage their mass exodus, the chairman of the board, Mike Ledwith said he was confident the medical and hospital staff would "continue to provide the level of patient care for which the (OHSC) ex mining group complimented them."

## Road budget two million

Halton County Council gave tentative approval to a road budget of almost \$2,000,000 at their March meeting. The construction and maintenance of roads, bridges and culverts will cost an estimated \$1,930,000.

The county's share of the bill is \$974,160 with the Department of Highways picking up the remainder. The county roads department had a surplus of \$40,000 last year which will be applied to this year's budget.

The figures will be considered at the April 13 County Council budget meeting. The biggest item will involve a \$255,000 grading and paving job on Trafalgar Road in the Drumquin area for a stretch of 1.4 miles.

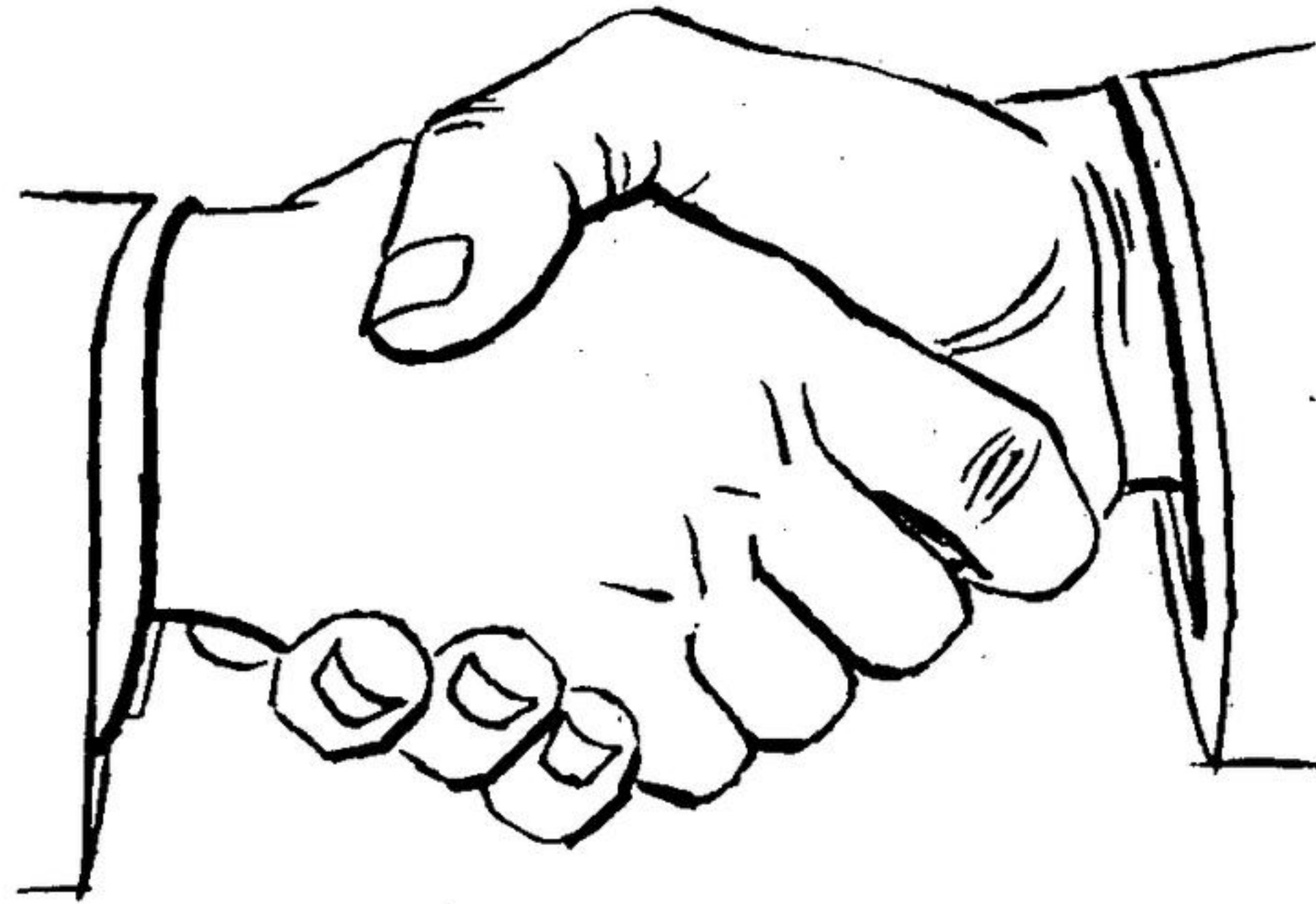
