The winners of this year's travelling scholarships, sponsored by the Junior Farmers' Association of Ontario, were announced at the annual provincial banquet on March 14.

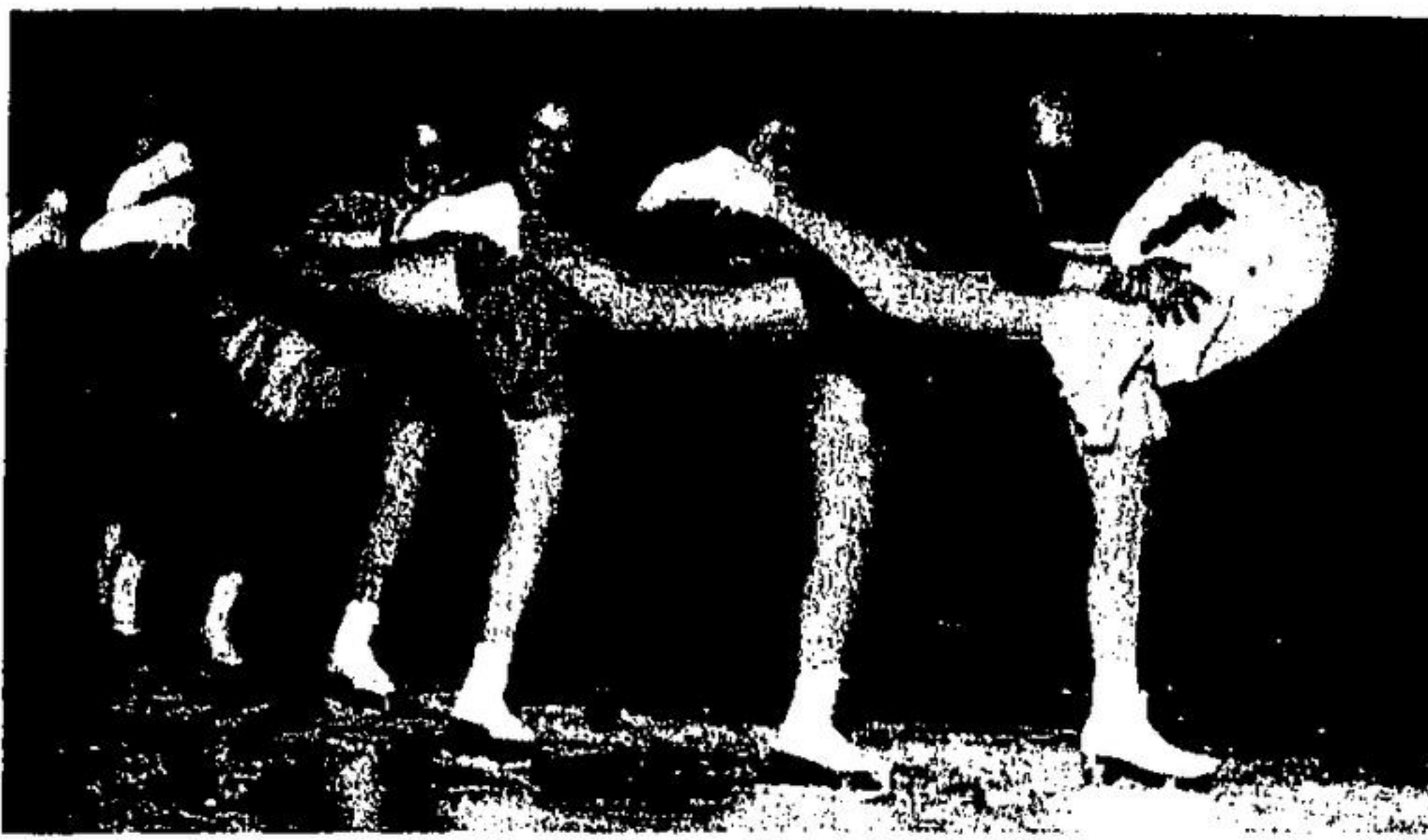
