

Jetport would bother OSD students hearing aids would amplify noise

Five hundred students at Ontario School for the Deaf in Milton used. External noise is kept to a minimum. The school buildings are this week joined the growing protest against the rumored jetport locating in Esquesing Township.

The deaf and hard of hearing students certainly don't want any jetports in this area-the noise of the jumbo jets would be picked up and amplified many times through the high powered amplification equipment that is located in every classroom in the school.

O.S.D. Superintendent Don Kennedy explained how a nearby jetport would adversely affect the school's educational program in a letter to the editor. Here is the complete text of his letter:

"We at OSD wish to object to the establishment of a jet airport in the vicinity of Milton, insofar as it would create problems in the

educational areas of the school.

"In each classroom, high powered amplification equipment is

located well back from Ontario St. to avoid highway noise. Classrooms are sound treated, but not to the extent that jet airplane noise can be excluded.

"If the school might be near the glidepath of aircraft our students would be subjected to considerable outside interference from jet noise that is amplified many times through their hearing aids. This problem would be one over which we could not devise controls, and therefore would adversely affect our education program."


