## Instant ambulance

Deputy-Reeve Art Speight of Georgetown was loudly praising the efficiency of the new province-wide ambulance set-up Monday afternoon, after the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service's new Cadillac ambulance was involved in an accident on a trip to Toronto.

He was called out of County Council's budget meeting Monday when it was learned the ambulance had been involved in the accident. "The accident happened at 1.32 p.m. and at 1.38 p.m. — four minutes later — another ambulance from Toronto had picked up the patient and was on the way to the hospital," Mr. Speight said.

When the Georgetown vehicle was involved in the collision the driver radioed to the provincial control and they had an ambulance in that area so it didn't take long to transfer the child patient, the nurse and the parents to the second vehicle.

## Wellington overspending now down from \$million

Wellington county board of education's budget entanglements continue, although the auditor has narrowed down its 1969 overspending from the previous "one million" figure to \$550,000. The board has been informed that the department of education will continue to withhold remaining 1969 grants.

During a meeting in Toronto Wellington board representatives learned that other school boards in the province are in the same financial position as the local board, and that at least one other board is in a worse situation with its accounts.

Trustees have accepted the recommendations of their auditor and will proceed to set the board's 1970 budget, follow through with the 1970 requisitions from the municipalities and apply for a 96 per cent payment of the adjusted provincial grant determined in the unaudited financial statement.

The auditor was asked to help unravel the financial chaos the board faces this year. In addition, the board will hire two qualified people to be temporarily employed to improve the 1969 accounts to the satisfaction of the auditor.
