The clergy speak out

It is nearly 2,000 years since the Apostle Paul is reported in the New-Testament to have said, "The love of money is the root of all evil."

Down through the years this has been a much misquoted statement. Oftentimes the phrase "love of" is omitted, and this changes entirely the meaning of the declaration. Paul was not condemning money as such; what he was condemning was the love of it, to the exclusion of moral rectitude and improper use of it.

Money represents power. One of the members of the famous international banking family of the Rothschilds is reported to have said something like this on one occasion, "Give me control of a nation's finances and I don't care what political party is in

There is a proverb among us which runs thus, "Money talks", It is because of the tremendous power associated with the possession of money that people covet it so much. It serves as the means of desired advancement in the social order, as well as in the economic realm of life.

In our so-called democratic way of life, it has too much power and too much say in just about every section of it.

Now we may replace the words "love of money" with the word "selfishness" without doing any violence to the meaning of Paul's declaration and this spirit of selfishness is one which is so prevalent in our time. The result is that sharp divisions arise between capital and labor and even within these two camps,

The writer of this article has been in sympathy with the basic aims of the union movement, i.e. the raising of the level of the economic status of the worker. What he fails to understand is this everlasting pressure on the part of certain segments of the labor force for ever-increasing wage demands and fringe benefits with no regard of the needs of other sections of that same labor force.

Surely there should be the desire in "a just society" to raise the level of living of ALL of the members of that society who are not receiving sufficient income to meet even the basic needs of life, namely, food, clothing, shelter and a sense of security.

What should be done by us is the seeking of a classless society which
