## Solves mystery of plant in photo

Your issue of April 22, 1970 had on page B8 a picture of a houseplant owned by Mrs. Bollert.

It is, I believe a member of the Philodendron family, not a Chinese evergreen as stated in your article. Chinese evergreens have no aerial roots which I believe can be seen in your photograph. The flowers are similar, those on the evergreen being unscented.

Descriptions in the Encyclopedia of House Plants by Dorothy H. Jenkins suggest that the plant might be

Philodendron Hostatum, or if the undersides of the leaves are maroon, it might be P. Imbe. Both of these plants have the arrow-shaped leaf as illustrated.

Those of the Chinese Evergreen are long ovals, smaller though than those of the Dieffenbachia.

A Philodendron is rather a rare sight in bloom, especially in a home.

My Chinese Evergreen is not in bloom at present, but does have about 30 seeds on

I was born and lived in Acton vicinity until 1914. At that date our family moved to Toronto where my sister and I still reside. 
