"The guys that are making a living out of it are the ones that should be hit," he charged.

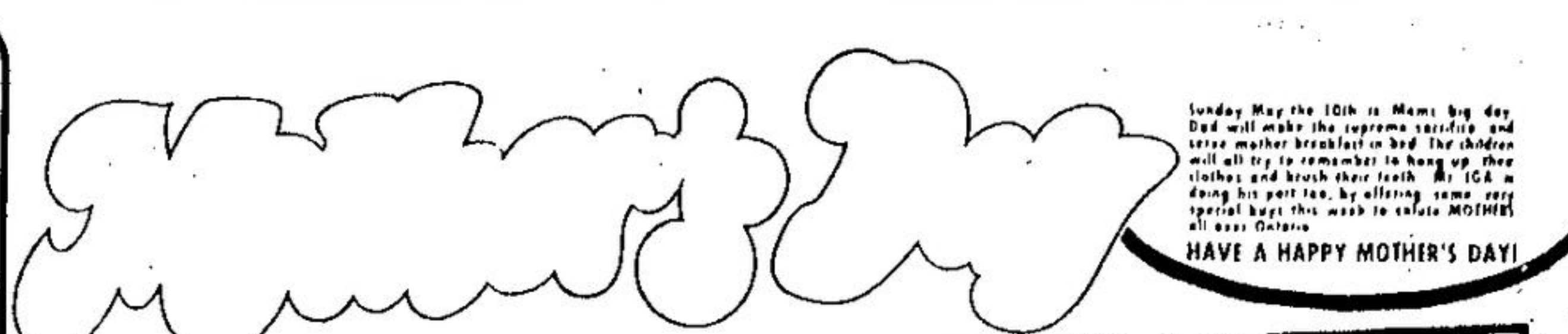
