Additions at two twp. schools

Additions will be made at two Erin township schools at a total cost of \$224,000.  
Contracts have been awarded to Witmer-Lazenby of Kitchener for additions to the Brisbane school and the Ross R. McKay school in Hillsburgh. They will consist of gymnasium general purpose rooms together with boys' and girls' changing rooms at both schools as well as some smaller alterations.  
The Brisbane school will cost \$97,185 with extras of \$6,317 for fees and \$4,413 for furniture.  
Contract price for the Ross R. McKay school which includes a teacher's room, is \$110,168, less \$3,305 federal sales tax plus fees of \$6,956 and furniture amounting to \$5,191.  
Both gymnasiums are 40 feet by 60 feet and include stages. Provision has also been made for their use by the community.  
Final approval for the projects just still come from the Department of Education and the Ontario Municipal Board.

Issue permit Scout lodge

Nassagaweya Township issued a building permit in April for work totalling \$52,000 for a lodge to be built at Blue Springs Scout Reserve, Sixth Line. Residential permits for one dwelling and two additions and a garage totalling \$23,000.  
Total work permitted amounts to \$76,000 for the month. Total for the year amounts to \$185,000.

Systems Construction is located on the same 100 acre parcel of land.

Propose 15 acre campground to be built north of Milton

The establishment of a 15 acre campground on property just east of Highway 25 and just south of Five Sideroad near Milton, will be referred to Esqueging township planning board for approval.

The proposed campground has already received approval of the Department of Highways and Halton County Health Unit. Milton council last week agreed to accept effluent from the site, trucked to its disposal plant.  
Bruce Pattison of Marchland Holdings, owners of the property, presented plans for the campground to Esqueging council at the regular Monday night meeting.

Mr. Pattison explained the campground would be the first of a chain to be established throughout the province and emphasized it would be designed to serve overnight campers only.  
The campground will contain 100 camp sites at first but long range plans call for 150. Each camp site will have its own picnic table and hydro and water facilities.  
An automatic laundry and flush toilets will also be provided. Access to the grounds will be off Five Sideroad.  
A strictly seasonal operation, the campground will be open from May 15 until September 15 only.  
The site was chosen because of its proximity to Highway 401 and the Kelso Conservation Area.  
"It will provide a badly needed stop-off point for campers", Mr. Pattison pointed out.  
Promoters hope to have the campgrounds in operation this summer, if township approval can be secured.  
Although the matter was referred to planning board, reaction from revee George Currie and deputy-revee Tom Hill was favorable.  
Deputy-revee Hill pointed out that when the land was purchased, the use was changed from agricultural to industrial.

Wedding, Walk-a-thon, reunion visits in news of district

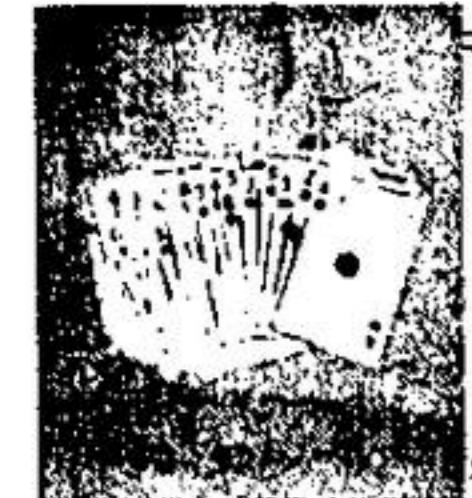

Let's Play Bridge

How can both sides make the same contract? It cannot happen, you say—well, it did happen last week at the Acton Bridge Club. Here are the hands.  
West dealt with North-South vulnerable

NORTH  
S-K 10 7 2  
H-A 9 7 5

Declarer held up in clubs for two rounds and then tackled hearts. North won the third round of hearts but had no more clubs. He tried a spade but East won with dummy's ace and took the obvious eight tricks—four hearts, one spade, two diamonds and one club. This seemed like a normal result.  
But look what happened at another table.

Opening lead - three of spades.

East and West were using a short club with a negative diamond response. South overcalled with his good club suits and it was North who bid hearts. South tried two no trump and that ended the auction.  
Declarer won the opening lead and immediately started the club suit. West waited three rounds before winning but East followed every round and could not signal.  
West had to take a chance and he tried the diamond suit. East took his ace and from the appearance of dummy decided to continue the suit. Two no trump made for North-South

with four clubs, two diamonds, the heart ace and one spade.  
This is one of the fascinations of duplicate—watching the same contract made with both the North-South cards and the East-West cards.  
Last week's winners at the Acton Bridge Club were: first, Midge and Frank Hampshire; tied for second, Betty Ashley and Harry Arbie with Kate Coats and Dick Priest.

That's the way the bidding went at one table. West opens one spade and East made a courtesy response with his six high card points. West with a balanced hand raised to two no-trump and East played the hand there.
