# **Health Unit staff** wants out of CUPE

About 90 per cent of the county offer apparently was not employees at Halton County as generous with increases for Health Unit have expressed an interest to no longer be represented by the Canadian Union of Public Employees in their negotiations with the county.

Most of the 39 employees have signed a petition asking the Ontario Labor Relations Board to decertify the CUPE Local 1205. A hearing will be held in Toronto tomorrow (Thursday) on the matter of decertification.

Local union representatives declined any comment on the move as did employees and county officials. Warden Allan Day noted the county would not take part in the move but would look on with interest.

A reliable source told The Champion the disenchantment of the employees started when the counterproposal offered by the county provided a greater wage for the employees in the lower wage bracket than the union had demanded. The
