Travelling art show here two days at M.Z.B. school

Halton County's travelling show played the M. Z. Bennett school for two days last week, and quite a few of those who came, returned again for another look.

There were 160 paintings on display, representing every school in Halton county and every grade from kindergarten to grade 13. Talented young people from Acton's three schools had their entries chosen. All were labelled. In charge of the show were Ed Thornadyke, co-ordinator of creative arts for the county, Bob Bateman and John Battersby.

All three were here to welcome Actonians and answer questions.

The show's opening was in Acton; from here it goes to Georgetown high school May 13 and 14; to Milton high school May 20 and 21; to Oakville art gallery May 26, 27, 28, 29 and 30; and to Burlington's Central arena June 2, 3, 4 and 5.

The M. Z. Bennett auditorium made a fine location for the display. School classes from the Robert Little school and high school as well as the M. Z. Bennett school trooped over to see the kind of work others are doing in their art classes.

"The public response was very good," enthused personable Mr. Thornadyke. "Credit must go to the students and teachers. Without their co-operation a show like this would be impossible."

He called to the attention of visitors the wide range of artistic expression, from imaginative surrealism to carefully detailed realism. No two art programs in the county are quite alike, Mr. Thornadyke explained. He stressed that the calibre of work is very high.

So many fine entries were submitted for this show that 160 were soon chosen, yet the next 320 were just so good the committee in charge had slides

made of them. They were not shown here due to lack of space.

This is the first time a travelling art show of this type has been organized.

Some adults and students were so delighted with the entries that they came back again to have another leisurely look at their favorites.
