"PLEASE OBEY THE LAW WITHOUT PREJUDICE"

The proper use and care of fireworks is as important as riding a bicycle, driving a car, or participating in bockey or other sports. Avoid injury to yourself and others. Do not spoil fun by

thoughtlessness and obuse, Fireworks may be SOLD six days prior to Empire Day, May 18 and Dominton Day, July 1 excluding Sundays. Family lireworks may not be sold or given to any person under the

age of 18 years. Family fireworks may be SET OFF on Empire Day May 18 and Dominion Day July 1 or the three days preceding these holidays. Persons 18 years or older may discharge fireworks on his own property or on other private property with the consent of the owner. When under 18 years of age the person must be under the supervision

of parents, guardians or other responsible persons. Setting off of fireworks is prohibited on public land, roads, buildings, elso prohibited in buildings or cars or any place where it would create a nuisance.

The above statements are "without prejudice" and constitute some important interpretations or opinions of bylaw No. 69-1463 of the Corporation of the Town of Acton, which bylaw regulates the use and sale of fireworks and firecreckers within the boundaries of the town of Acton pnly.
