Rosslake owner applies for heliport license

Rosslake airstrip owner Joe Ross has applied to the Department of Transport for a license to operate a heliport. Mr. Ross appeared at Monday night's meeting of Esquing Council to request formal acknowledgement of his application. The Department ordered the airstrip closed March 1, claiming the surrounding area had become built-up. Esquing Council had previously referred complaints of area residents to the Department of Transport, after three "minor" accidents two of which involved plans overshooting the runway. The strip is located at the corner of the Fifth Line and 17 Sideroad, on the Ross farm. Council agreed to have clerk-treasurer Delmar French write the Department to acknowledge Mr. Ross' application.

Is this what the people want?

The Halton County Board of Education believes that it must retain the right to manage its schools. There seems to be a body of secondary school teacher opinion that thinks otherwise. Much has been said about the teachers' request to negotiate working conditions.

What does this mean?

- It means that if the following items from the O.S.S.T.F. Salary Brief were implemented in our secondary schools, the increased costs to the taxpayer are estimated as follows:
1. **13 audio-visual Technicians:**\$ 90,000.00
 2. **Class-size:** If the pupil-teacher ratio in Halton were reduced from 18.5:1 to 16.5:1, the increased instructional costs would be: 1,000,000.00
 3. **Education Leave**
The Board has allocated 3/4 of 1% of the Instructional Salary Budget for Educational Development and Leave. Halton Division, O.S.S.T.F. has asked for 1% of the Instructional Salary budget or an increase of: 25,000.00
 4. **President**
Halton Division, O.S.S.T.F. requests that the President of Halton Division be released from his teaching duties during the year of office and that his salary and benefits be paid by the Board: 11,000.00
 5. **Professional Development**
Halton Division, O.S.S.T.F. asks for an increase from 1/4 to 1/2 of 1% of the Instructional Salary budget for professional development or an increase of: 25,000.00
 6. **Teacher — Secretarial Ratio**
Halton Division, O.S.S.T.F. states that the existing secretarial ratio does not work and that the size of the secretarial staff should be established by the principal in consultation with his staff. If one secretary were added to each secondary school, the increased cost would be: 65,000.00
 7. **Summer and Night School Allowance**
Halton Division, O.S.S.T.F. asks for a payment of \$12 per hour for teaching night school or summer school. This amounts to a 20% increase or: 25,000.00
- Total** \$1,241,000.00
No discussion has yet taken place on salary items.
