The Halton and Peel Association for the Hearing Handicapped will stage a walkathon this Saturday with proceeds going towards repairs and renovations to the Ontario Mission for the Deaf Farm on Highway 25 north of Milton.

The farm operated by Mr. and Mrs. H. Dueck provides a home

for nine deaf children, some of whom are emotionally disturbed. The home is operated with very little help from provincial or federal grants. The children at the home are in need of a recreation room and the roof on the house needs replacing. Proceeds from the walk will go towards achieving these aims.

## Board, Federation issue joint press release

In an effort to clarify what might be misleading information Paul Martindale, President of Halton Division of O.S.S.T.F. and Liberty Pease, Chairman of the Salary Committee for the Halton County Board of Education issued a joint statement this week.

The statement the two parties agreed that class size is related in principal to pupil-teacher ratio. In a recent advertisement placed in Halton County papers by the Board there was reference to what it would cost to decrease the teacher pupil ratio from 18.5 to 16.5.

The release explains the figures were used for the purpose of illustration and notes that the teachers have asked that ratio not be increased this year.

## 32-mile walk on Saturday OSD man goes at \$5 mile

If students from Acton and Milton appear to be catching up on their rest this week, it's probably because they are preparing for a 32-mile walkathon this Saturday.

The walk on highways and county roads between Milton, Acton, Hornby and Silvercreek is being sponsored by the Halton and Peel Association for the Hearing Handicapped, with funds earmarked for repairs and renovations at the Ontario Mission for the Deaf farm home north of Milton on Highway 25. This home cares for nine deaf students, some of whom are emotionally disturbed. It's the second annual big walk sponsored by MPAHH. Last year over 200 students from Acton and 100 from Milton joined in

the day of fun and raised over \$5,500 from sponsors who pledged to back them at pennies, nickels and dimes per mile completed.

Probably the highest-paid walker in the group this Saturday morning will be Don Kennedy, Superintendent of OSD in Milton. He offered to join in the march and the Rotary Club of Milton has agreed to sponsor him at \$5 a mile. Mr. Kennedy said he doesn't expect to go the whole distance but if he does it could cost the service club \$160.

Most of the walkers will be teenagers but adults are also welcome to participate, reports G. Bradford Clements of Milton, MPAHH president. Acton walkers will start at 7 a.m. from

the Acton Community Centre while Milton's group will take off at the same time from Martin St. school. Checkpoints, refreshment booths and first aid patrols along the route will be manned by Association volunteers.
