

# Tanners waver twixt A and B

The executive of the Acton Tanners intermediate hockey club has reiterated an earlier decision to ice a team in the O.H.A. again next season.

"It was the best season in several years using mostly local young fellows and there is hope for the future," a member of the executive summed up the season at the year end meeting of the club last week.

There were losses at the gate but Beardmore and Co. picked up the tab allowing the team to start next season with a clean slate.

Pressing question for next season is whether the team should stay in the Intermediate B bracket or jump up a notch into Intermediate A. The team would be allowed six imports if the executive decides to take the step.

It was decided if suitable

players are available the Tanners would take the step up to the higher bracket, otherwise the team would stay in the B class for at least another year. Among the clubs who are in the Intermediate A series are Burlington, Dundas, Brantford, Georgetown, Fort Erie, Port Colborne and Simcoe.

Manager Harold Speaker told the executive he has already booked ice for practices at Galt arena in September until the winter operation is started in Acton. The importance of an early start was emphasized.

President Jack Marshall outlined details of the recent O.H.A. meeting which he attended with manager Speaker, "Sonny" Townsley and Bob Marshall. It is now mandatory for players in all intermediate hockey classes to wear helmets.

# Oakville dumps Rams 16-10 with third period splurge

Oakville juniors bounced back from a lack-lustre second period performance to net eight third period goals and hand Acton Rams a 16-10 defeat, here Monday night. The win was the first of the regular season for Oakville, while Rams suffered their second straight loss.

The tough and tumble contest attracted the season's largest crowd to the community centre. A total of 29 penalties, 15 to Oakville and 14 Rams were called in the game.

Rod McEachern started in the Acton nets, but was replaced by Gary Turkosz at the 14:30 mark of the opening period, after allowing Oak's fifth goal.

Turkoz turned in a creditable showing the rest of the way, but the visitors took advantage of his small stature to beat him with shots to the upper corners of the cage.

Oakville jumped into a 7-2 first period lead, but Rams fought back to outscore them 4-1 in the second stanza and appeared to be on their way to an upset victory, when Bob Turkosz narrowed the count to 8-7 after only 35 seconds of play in the third period.

But Oaks scored three times within a minute and 23 seconds to all but wrap up the win.

Bob Waller and Alan McKenzie were Acton's best performers of the night. Waller fired a hat trick, all in the second period.

Bob Turkosz also bagged a hat trick for the locals, Fred Flisnik scored twice and Chris Sargent and Mike Marcoux added one each. Sargent's goal was his first of the season.

Bob Turkosz collected four assists, Gary Turkosz three and Paul Cooper, Stu McCulloch and Sargent one apiece.

Brian Bennett scored five times for the winners, Phil Morgan, Bill Hillis and Ken Smith twice each and Gary Balanger, Grant Bennett, Jim Glass, Joe Cipolla and Doug McFarland once each.

Oakville goalie Gary Brick robbed Rams several times in the third period.

Bob Turkosz was successful on his second attempt at SCOR O between the second and third periods, Bob was shooting for O.L.A. referee-in-chief John Payne, who held the lucky number program. Mr. Payne generously donated the \$5 prize to Rams. SCOR-O will be a regular feature of Ram home games.
