Bashful Bob fathers two more buffalo

Bashful Bobby, the bull bison who fathered calves from four female buffalo, has two new additions to his herd at the Rattlesnake Point wildlife compound, near Milton.

The calves were born May 11 and 12 and the other two wives are expecting within the next week. The new pair brings the strength of the herd to 10.

Bobby (who acquired his nickname in 1967 when the herd failed to reproduce) and his four females were the first free-roaming buffalo in Ontario when the Halton Region Conservation Authority purchased them from the Buffalo National Park, Alberta in 1965.

The public may view the buffalo from scenic trails along the Niagara escarpment within the Rattlesnake Point Conservation Park. Buffalo and public are separated from each other by an eight foot fence made of wire.

Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area where the buffalo roam is located on 10 Sideroad, west of Highway 25, near Milton.
