Semester basis decided for Christian Education

The invitational meeting with the teachers of the combined Christian Educational Project staff and the parents of the children attending the last Saturday in the month Sunday School was one of poor attendance last Wednesday evening and the small representation of parents could well be purpointed to either poor advertising or lack of parental interest.

Eight teachers and five parents attended the open meeting which had been called by the directors to determine if the project was working in accord with the paients and whether it was worthwhile to continue at its present rate; also if the once-a-month program of religious teaching was sufficient.

Although there were not table, enough parents on hand to come to any definite conclusion as to the feasibility of continuing the Sunday School with such long intervening intervals between sessions, it was concluded, based on a telephone survey conducted by Mrs. Sitska Drijber, that, although considered to be a

worthwhile project most parents would be more pleased if it were held more often.
