

Third bank will hold Open House on Saturday

Acton's third bank is introducing its new quarters and staff at Open House this Saturday, and will be open for business Monday. The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce is opening its branch here in the renovated building which was formerly Morris Pharmacy and before that Earl Cooper's pharmacy.

The new manager Del Cook, his wife and two young children are now living in the apartment above the bank. Others on his staff so far are accountant Don Lawrence, who has been transferred from Sault Ste. Marie, teller Mrs. Diane Logan, transferred from the Georgetown branch and typist Mrs. Heather Townsend, transferred from the Georgetown branch.

Mr. Cook is very optimistic about the new bank's future in Acton. A survey had been taken which showed the town was ready for another bank, and he feels the service his staff will offer is needed.

He also points out the Bank of Commerce is the only bank in town with Chargex — the country's most popular credit card.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Cook come from the Erin district. He started with the bank in Guelph where

he worked for two years; he's since been a year at Ancaster, a year at Kingston, a year at Picton, a year at Keswick and a year at Collingwood where he was accountant and manager's assistant.

This is his first managing position.

They are happy to be near their Erin friends and relatives but Mrs. Cook points out they've enjoyed any town they've been in and expect to be very happy in Acton, too.

Mr. Cook is interested in hockey and baseball. He coached

the Collingwood Shipbuilders Junior hockey team last year.

The friendly new manager and the regional manager for eastern and northern Ontario, E. S. Duffield of Toronto, will be welcoming the visitors they hope will drop into their new bank this Saturday afternoon. The mayor, Les Doby, will be joining them.

The bank is very attractively

decorated in muted browns and golds, with the manager's office right at the front. Woodwork is in walnut finish, and there are bright pictures to accent the walls.

Air conditioning is being installed, and the furniture and equipment is presently all being placed in readiness for the Open House this week.

Halton, Peel brigades at inspection

Over 150 spectators attended the annual Halton and Peel St. John Ambulance Inspection held at Milton arena Thursday. Oakville, Acton, Milton, Port Credit, Burlington, Brampton and Malton senior and cadet Divisions were on hand for the program.

The agenda included a general salute, inspection of ranks, accident demonstrations, closing remarks and dismissal. Lt. Col. H. L. Brown, O. St. J., C.D., Deputy Provincial Commissioner headed the inspection party and Sgt. Major G. Coleman led the parade of 150 St. John members. Music for the inspection was played by the Milton Girls Pipe Band headed by Pipe Sgt. Marilyn Martin.

For the demonstrations Oakville and Burlington combined divisions and illustrated a mock snowmobile accident in which two men were injured. They showed how to move patients from the wreck and how to administer medical attention before and en route to hospital.

Acton and Milton brigades combined to show a mock electrical accident where two men had been on a ladder, had received a severe electric shock and fallen from the ladder. The group also administered medical attention to the patients.

Brampton, Port Credit and Malton divisions illustrated a mock accident in which a tent

had collapsed injuring the people within. "Usually we have two groups combining to form a team but with the new Malton brigade the number was uneven," said Milton's Supt. Don Miller.

A light lunch was served afterward.

Notes no action on garbage incinerator

In a move to spark some action at the county level concerning garbage incineration, Milton Reeve Ron Harris urged Halton County Council's property committee look into the matter or a new committee be formed to study the idea and bring back a report.

Mr. Harris told Council at their May meeting the subject had been brought up over a year ago and he had heard no report. Chairman of the property committee Oakville Deputy Reeve William Gillies assured Mr. Harris the matter was on the agenda and a report would be forthcoming.

Children's Aid negotiating possible move to Burlington

Halton Children's Aid Society is negotiating a move that would have their offices moved from Milton to Burlington, likely in July.

At a recent meeting the Board approved a motion that they rent a two storey building on John St. Burlington, across from Wellington Mall. The yearly rent of the broadloomed, air conditioned office would amount to \$24,841.25.

For some time the Board has sought better, more suitable office space and has been unable to locate anything in Milton or Oakville.

Halton County Councillors on the Board objected to the move because it entailed a five year lease. With regional government up in the air it is possible the county could find itself with C.A.S. offices in Burlington and Burlington being taking in with a

Hamilton region.

C.A.S. said something had to be done and the Board had waited for quite some time to see what effects regional government will have, and it appears nothing will happen for a while.

Director Dr. G. K. Askwith said there were so many things that might happen that the Society couldn't really wait for them all to materialize. The facilities they have in an old house on Hughes St. in Milton have been inadequate for sometime. There has been some consideration to renovating the existing facilities, to buy a new building or finally move into other existing facilities.

Prices for improvements on the new building are not yet settled but recommended improvements are expected to cost in the vicinity of \$11,000.
