Cigarette smokers, immune to most anti-smoking campaigns, could hardly help but be affected by experiments conducted in the lab at Acton District high school during open house.

Under the direction of department head Allan Eastwood, students set up an artificial smoking machine which showed the effects of cigarette smoking on water, goldfish, blood and a facsimile of the larynx.

Visitors were appalled at the amount of nicotine culled from both filter and non-filter cigarettes. The demonstration showed effects of a few fags up to a number of packs.
