Solicitor warns council

Esquering developer carves out 200 lots by circumventing separation by-laws

Township solicitor Terry Baines warned Esquering council a developer had legally circumvented separation by-laws and carved up 200 lots on the

Fifth Line, directly above the Base Line between Milton and Hornby.

Mr. Baines said the developer had taken a musty legal device

which had fallen into disuse and divided 130 acres into lots approximately 102 feet long by 150 feet deep by a method not covered by the Planning Act. However, Mr. Baines felt the developer had made an error and he could stop the development "cold" with the imposition of a restraining order.

"Then", he said, "council could deal with the owners in the future."

Questioned by flabbergasted councillors, the township solicitor said the loophole in the Act had been exploited before in a well known case against the wishes of a nearby municipality and the Department of Municipal Affairs, indicating there was little likelihood it could be stopped by the usual methods.

Council authorized Mr. Baines to do what was necessary to clamp a restraining order on the developer.

The development concerns parts of Lots One and Two between the Fourth and Fifth Lines. A former assessor alerted

Township seeks legal advice to oppose Hydro's new line

Nassagaweya Planning Board will seek legal advice on the best method of opposing the Hydro transmission line along the diagonal route proposed by Ontario Hydro.

Members agreed to the action during their regular meeting on Wednesday of last week.

The Board was uncertain about whether it had authority to seek such advice and agreed to it following a check with the clerk-administrator.

The topic, a regular one at recent meetings, occupied much of the meeting as members reviewed plans and alternates for the hydro transmission line cutting diagonally across the north west corner of the township.

Council had been promised last week that a detailed map of the route proposed by Hydro would be submitted as soon as it was returned from the printers. The Board agreed to call a meeting of the sub committee on the topic as soon as the maps were received.

Reeve A. MacArthur indicated she would expect the committee to prepare the details for the township's case which is to be presented directly to the Ontario Hydro Commissioners. The committee and the planning board chairman with the Reeve, are expected to make up the delegation.

"We will take a very strong stand and do the very best we can," Mrs. MacArthur said of the end of June encounter with the Commission.

Councillor Allan Ackman charged the Commission was

withholding information on its proposed route while they have the township's alternates and proposals to prepare their case against. He noted he had received legal advice the township could not stop the Hydro from buying the land but it could stop the triangulation of lots which would require approval of the local Committee of Adjustment or finally the Ontario Municipal Board.

Norval citizens claim hole closes up road

Esquering Council passed a resolution forbidding Riviera owner Emil Zuber to use any part of the township road allowance which runs in front of the popular Norval night spot for any purpose, following a visit from a delegation of aroused Norval home owners Monday night.

Spokesmen Julian Reed and Doug Fishburn told council Mr. Zuber had partially closed the road in front of his dance hall with an excavation about 100 feet long and 30 to 40 feet wide and the eight foot deep hole had water in it over a foot deep. The delegation felt Mr. Zuber's excavation amounted to road closure and council should take action to stop further digging as well as restoring the land to its former condition.

York St., the disputed road, has been used by Norval citizens ever since he could remember.

Mr. Ackman recalled he had been asked if there was anything in the township's official plan that would prohibit construction of the utility line. He acknowledged there was not, but there was protection against the triangulation of properties which is what would result in the proposed diagonal route.

Chairman Gordon Agnew pointed out a recent

controversial Bill 89 should be borne in mind. It gives the Minister of Municipal Affairs the power to supercede local official plans and zoning by-laws in the public interest.

"If that means the overriding of our official plan I would ask the resignation of every member of council and planning board because we're just wasting our time sitting here", Councillor Ackman declared.

Considerable discussion developed on what action the board would consult in obtaining advice on how to

oppose the diagonal transmission line route.

"Are you going to hire a \$1,000 a day lawyer?" Chairman Agnew inquired.

"If I find we're not going to get top legal advice for some few dollars I'll raise hell and so will the people in the north", Councillor Ackman maintained. Members agreed to investigate the matter of fee.

A letter from the Hon. George Kerr, Minister of Energy and Resources Management and provincial representative for the riding including Nassagaweya, wrote pointing out the Ontario Hydro was doing everything possible to meet local objections. He observed negotiations were being carried on by the township and hydro and he hoped for meaningful discussion.

"That's a nothing letter", one member observed.
