Former postmaster here Frank Terry mourned

A resident of Acton for 27 years and a former postmaster here, Frank Terry died following a fatal heart seizure while playing in a postmasters golf tournament Wednesday of last week at the Wasaga Beach Golf and Country Club. Also playing in the tournament was his successor as postmaster in Acton, Gordon McKeown, who Saturday acted as one of the pallbearers.

Popular Mr. Terry had moved to Owen Sound 10 years ago as postmaster, but Mr. and Mrs. Terry still looked upon Acton as their home town and made frequent visits. As a charter member, he was a special guest at the Lions club's 10th anniversary dinner and dance the weekend before, and had visited with friends over the weekend.

Mr. Terry is survived by his wife, the former Irene Glendinning of Galt; one daughter Patricia (Mrs. Lorne McBride) of Kitchener, two grandchildren Beverly and Terry; and a sister Helen Terry in Calgary.

He was born April 15, 1910 in England, son of the late Edward and Mary Jane Terry, and came to Canada in 1915. Mr. and Mrs. Terry were married at Galt in 1933.

He came to Acton at 18 and worked as outside foreman at Beardmore and Co. During World War II he served overseas with the Hamilton Light Infantry regiment, rising to the rank of captain. He was a member of the Owen Sound Legion and a past member of Acton Legion.

With Acton Chamber of Commerce he organized the designing of the "sputniks" which are hung on the street each Christmas.

He was a former member of Walker Lodge A.F. and A.M. Noted in sports circles as a great "playmaker", Frank Terry played both baseball and hockey. He played with Guelph and Galt teams, and was a member of the Acton Tanners the year they won the Ontario Intermediate championship.

Rev. A. H. McKenzie conducted the funeral service at the Rumley-Shoemaker funeral home on Saturday afternoon, June 20, and interment was in Fairview cemetery, Acton. Pallbearers were assistant postmaster at Owen Sound Wilfred Millbank, Ray Arbie, George Moss, James Moss, Lloyd Brannick and Gordon McKeown.

Township dream

Industrial subdivision instead of quarry?

"I wish Nassagaweya had enough money to expropriate Cloverleaf Quarry holdings. We could develop a tremendous industrial complex there with water and roads already available." Reeve A. MacArthur observed to fellow members of the township planning board Wednesday.

Mrs. MacArthur noted the O.M.B. hearing on an application to rezone the holdings from quarry holding to quarry had been deferred. She expressed concern for people in the area if the lands were changed to active quarrying, located across from Mohawk Raceway and close to the village of Campbellville.

The reeve pointed out the county had spent \$150,000 building a road in the area and an adequate water supply could be developed to attract acceptable types of industry.

She also noted the assessment that could be developed for the township would be greater than that accruing from a quarry.

Board Chairman Gordon Agnew pointed out provincial interest in the escarpment was evident and the province might be interested in considering this aspect of land acquisition. Councillor Allan Ackman noted conservation land abutted the proposed quarry site which could increase the authority's interest too.

The subject was discussed as members heard a committee report from BOARD Member John Kitchen as he reviewed plans to begin a study of land uses in the township. Information was being assembled from the Department of Mines and conservation authorities on uses and proposals for drafting maps.

Board members continued to express concern about the absence of promised information

from Ontario Hydro on the route of the EHV transmission line scheduled to angle across the municipality.

Hydro Chairman George Gatherede assured members he would advise them of the date on which they could meet the full Commission to present their views.

The possibility the information from Hydro might only precede the meeting by days or hours caused members concern. Councillor Ackman reported individual property owners had been to Toronto and had had been shown how the line would affect their property on a large map but no such map was being made available to council and planning board. "It infuriates me they're treating Planning Board and Council like a bunch of idiots."

A meeting was to be called as soon as information was received and Chairman Agnew suggested there might only be 24 to 48 hours to prepare the presentation to the Commission.

"Why don't we just tell the subdividers to save their time and not bother?" Board Member Don Smith queried as members reviewed correspondence on proposed subdivisions in the township.

A proposal for a subdivision at Moffat correspondence indicated, could not proceed with installation of septic tanks since drainage and porosity were not satisfactory. The Brookville proposal drew comments from the Department of Municipal Affairs that it should be considered in the light of the Design for Development proposal by the province. That proposal indicated development should be limited except in existing urban

centres with the area generally earmarked for recreation conservation and agriculture uses.

Comments on the Eden Park development at Eden Mills also drew references from the province on the relationship to the Design for Development.

"The government is taking a serious look at subdivisions", Chairman Agnew noted.

"The ultimate result is that there won't be any" Councillor Ackman acknowledged.
