The possibility the information from Hydro might only precede the meeting with the Commission by days or hours caused members concern. A meeting was to be called as soon as information was received and Chairman Agnew suggested there might only be 24 to 48 hours to prepare the presentation to the Commission.

" Why don't we just tell the subdividers to save their time and not bother?" Board Member Don Smith queried as members reviewed correspondence on proposed subdivisions in the township.

A proposal for a subdivision at Moffat correspondence indicated, could not proceed with installation of septic tanks since drainage and porosity were not satisfactory. The Brookville proposal drew comments from the Department of Municipal Affairs that it should be considered in the light of the Design for Development proposal by the province.
