

Rams gain first win edge Mohawks

"It feels wonderful, everything went right for us tonight," a jubilant Acton Ram coach Howard Dwyer beamed last night, after his charges had come from behind a 6-5 deficit to score eight third period goals and chalk up their first win of the boxla season, a 13-12 thriller over Elora Mohawks.

Gary Kelley took a pass from captain Bob Turkoz to net the game winner with only a minute and 44 seconds remaining in the game and goalie Gary Turkoz capped off a brilliant display of reminding by stopping Mohawk ace Bill Little in the last 15 seconds, to save the win.

The win was strictly a team effort, nevertheless. Ten players shared in Rams' scoring and only three players scored more than once.

Bob Turkoz started the Acton scoring with a goal at 1:09 of the opening frame and newcomer Bob Gowland connected on the first shot he fired at 2:50.

Rams built up a 4-2 lead at the end of the first period, but were clipped for seven penalties in the second period and fell behind 6-5.

Fred Flisnik's goal at the 30 second mark of the final frame paved the way for the Acton comeback.

Gary Kelley, Bob Turkoz and Fred Flisnik each scored twice for the locals, Craig Weldon, Dave Cooksley, Chris Sargent, Bob Roughley, Stu McCulloch, Bob Gowland and Mike Marcoux netted one apiece.

Gary Kelley earned three assists, Bob Turkoz, Bob Walker, Stu McCulloch, Mike Marcoux and George McPhail picked up one apiece.

Ken Chapman with three and John Lovell and Randy Graham with two each were the top Mohawk snipers.

Rams held Bill Little and Rick McKenna, a duo that combined for 11 goals in Elora Saturday night, to a mere goal apiece.

The season's largest crowd was kept on the edge of their collective seats right up until the final buzzer sounded.

Rams play in Oakville tonight (tonight) then host Kitchener for the first time, Monday night.

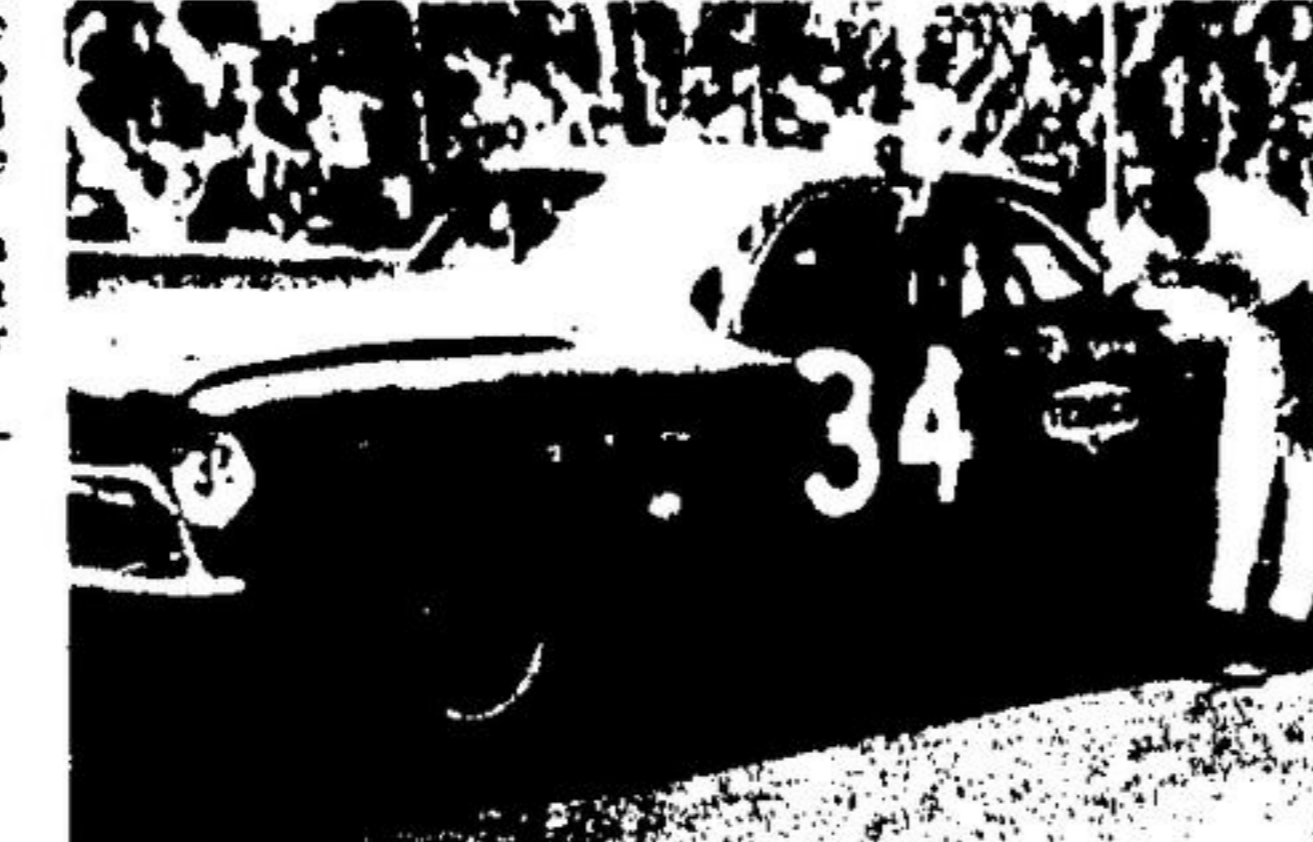
