in the basic amount of the old age security pension and allowances. Since 1966 when the present old

age pension benefits were established, the cost of living has gone up by 15.7 per cent while pensions have only gone up by 6.1 per cent -- they are now 9.6 per cent behind, he said.

Mr. Britton pointed out that 51 per cent of Canada's one and a half million old age pensioners are drawing the guaranteed income supplement on the basis of a means test and 31 per cent are drawing the full amount of the supplement. In order to draw this supplement, one must be below the poverty line and have literally nothing else.

He felt that as these people needed the money, it would be spent almost immediately therefore putting it back in the general economy which in turn would help case the present recession in the country.
