Gun buffs flock to show Sunday

Gun collectors are a rare lot. They came from many parts of the province, as far away as Ottawa, to make the second gun show of the Halton Antique Gun Collectors a decided success, Sunday, at Acton arena.

Exhibits of guns, shells, daggers, bayonets, war uniforms, binoculars, medals and army issue drew hundreds to look at displays, swap and buy Sunday morning and the early part of the afternoon. The show wound up with an auction sale conducted by Gabriel Bourget.

Halton president Lee Maglaughlen of Georgetown was

more than pleased with the turnout and the displays which filled exhibit tables for over one-third of the arena floor. It isn't often there is such response, he said.

Treasurer Hank Ruppert of Acton said there were several new members signed for the Halton club and the response to this show exceeded expectations. The first show in the spring at the music centre filled all available space, necessitating the larger quarters.

Some of the exhibitors were setting up displays as early as 7.30 in the morning after rising

before the sun came up. Registrations at the door were steady until early afternoon with "Pop" Mann and Hank Ruppert signing in visitors.

The club plans another show on the Labor Day weekend in conjunction with the Acton Hi-Flyer model show.

Double expected school enrolment

A full bus load of Acton students are going to Gordon E. Purdue high school, Oakville, each day to take summer courses there. The bus leaves at 7 a.m. and returns in the afternoon.

Classes started Monday and a variety of problems presented themselves for principal Robert Langlois.

Enrolment was over 1250—twice the normal size of summer school. Some classes were filled to overflowing and there weren't enough teachers. Some of those who registered late (including some from Acton) were unable to be accommodated. On the other hand some Acton students found there weren't enough in

the class of their choice and it was cancelled. Some took other courses instead but, of course, others wanted only the one subject they had failed in.

Allan Eastwood of the local high school staff is teaching in the science department. He explained the department found itself at first with half the teachers required, but they have already managed to acquire more.

Nearly 50 students registered from Acton, some of them deciding to go after the official deadline. Apparently almost all of them have managed to be accommodated.

Driving on freeway different from town

The reporting week of June 28 to July 4 was one of moderate activity at the Acton Detachment. The town cruiser was patrolled 721 miles while the men worked a total of 224 hours.

A two car accident put an end to a month's accident free driving in the town. Total damage in this accident was \$300 and the erring driver was charged under the Highway Traffic Act. A total of four motorists were issued traffic citations and seven warnings issued.

A total of six general occurrences were investigated one in which a home was broken into. This case is still under investigation. A minor disturbance in a local hotel and a domestic dispute rounded the week off.

In Provincial Court, Milton, 14 convictions were registered on the Acton docket with fines of \$268 being paid.

Driving in and about Acton and driving on a freeway are two different things. Freeway driving is different and requires your full attention especially when entering or leaving these high speed arteries. As you enter a freeway on the acceleration lane, always check approaching freeway traffic, then pick up speed so that you merge smoothly at approximately freeway driving speed. To leave a freeway, get into the right lane as you approach the turn off. Signal your intentions well in advance and reduce speed as you enter the turn off lane.

Remember, when entering or leaving a freeway it is important to do so smoothly. Co-operation reduces the chances of freeway collisions.

So don't let an accident spoil your trip, and have a good time.
