and harder to repair than either fibreglass or canvas. Canvas of course is more fragile than the other varieties. Straight fibreglass canoes in the 70 lb. class are usually very flexible.

This may be all right as far as durability is concerned and strength as they tend to give rather than crack when a rock or other obstruction is hit but this also makes for hard paddling when the bottom bounces with every stroke of the paddle.

Canoes and canoeing have been very popular of late. Since this is one of my personal hobbies I would like to offer my findings in their use.

We have found the best canoe to be of cedar — the same as the regular canvas canoe, only covered with fibreglass instead of canvas. The combination of fibreglass and cedar makes a very rigid yet light canoe. The one I use weighs in at 68 lbs. and is 16 feet long 36 inches wide and 14 inches deep. This canoe has a carrying capacity of close to 1/2 ton and is exceptionally easy to paddle when loaded.

The type of canoe to buy, of course, depends on the use to which the canoe is to be put. If your canoeing is limited to the local lake with just an occasional paddle around, then almost any canoe will suit you. However, for a canoe trip your canoe should be chosen with greater care. For carrying capacity the canoe should be at least 35 inches wide by 14 inches deep. For short weekend trips a 14-foot canoe is fine but for a trip of a week or more the canoe should be 16 feet long.

Another thing to check closely when buying a canoe is the weight. Many canoes are advertised at far less than their actual weight. A reputable manufacturer or dealer won't mind you checking the advertised weight on an accurate scale.

Type of construction varies considerably with individual taste but weight is an important factor if there are portages on your planned route. If you have many or long portages a canoe should weigh no more than 70 lbs.

One thing we have noticed of late is the apparent ignorance of motor boat operators to the fact that canoes and sailboats have the right-of-way over motor boats. All motor boats must slow down when approaching or passing same.

The things to compare in canoe construction are weight, ease of repair and maintenance.

This rule of boating safety is being ignored by many boat operators throughout Canada — even in Fairy Lake.

As a general rule aluminum canoes tend to be a little heavier

even in Fairy Lake.
