Canoes and canoeing have been very popular of late. Since this is one of my personal hobbies I would like to offer my findings in their use.

The type of canoe to buy, of course, depends on the use to which the canoe is to be put. If your canoeing is limited to the local lake with just an occasional paddle around, then almost any canoe will suit you. However, for a canoe trip your canoe should be chosen with greater care. For carrying capacity the canoe should be at least 35 inches wide by 14 inches deep. For short weekend trips a 14-foot cance is fine but for a trip of a week or more the canoe should be 16 feet

Type of construction varies considerably with individual taste but weight is an important factor if there are portages on your planned route. If you have many or long portages a canoe should weigh no more than 70 lbs. The things to compare in canoe

construction are weight, ease of repair and maintenance. As a general rule aluminum canoes tend to be a little heavier

> We have found the best cance to be of cedar — the same as the regular canvas cance, only covered with fibreglass instead of Bob Turkosz scores Seven fibreglass and cedar makes a very rigid yet light cance. The one I use weighs in at 68 lbs. and is 16 feet long 36 inches wide and 14 inches deep. This canoe has a carrying capacity of close to 1/2 ton and is exceptionally easy to paddle when loaded.

Another thing to check closely when buying a canoe is the weight. Many canoes are advertised at far less than their actual weight. A reputable manufacturer or dealer won't mind you checking the advertized weight on an accurate scale.

One thing we have noticed of late is the apparent ignorance of motor boat operators to the fact that canoes and sailboats have the right-of-way over motor. boats. All motor boats must slow down when approaching or passing same.

This rule of boating safety is being ignored by many boat operators throughout Canada even in Fairy Lake.
