Grant toward conservation

Jim Snow, MPP for Halton East announced today the approval of a Provincial grant of \$1,850 to the Halton Region Conservation Authority to undertake further development work in the Esqueping Conservation Area.

This Conservation Area comprises approximately 40 acres of land in the Township of Esqueping.

The Authority proposes raising the earth embankment along the spillway of the dam constructed last year and seeding the area to prevent erosion. Other proposed development includes extensive woodlot improvement, installation of drainage tile, and other general development work. All member municipalities will bear the Authority's share of the cost.
