Drug arrest brings concern for others

During the week of July 8 to 12 the officers at the Acton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 234 hours while patrolling 988 miles in the town cruiser.

Occurrences investigated included a break and enter, one family dispute, a dispute in a local hotel, and a missing three year old boy who was found riding his bicycle two miles from his home and who wanted to know what the bike was all about. The story had a happy ending and that's the main thing!

A motor vehicle accident resulting in a total of \$1,200 damages were investigated. And a total of seven charges were laid under the Highway Traffic Act, while 18 warnings were issued. One other motorist was charged with driving a motor vehicle without insurance.

A fairly light Acton docket in Provincial Court saw \$385. in fines levied.

On Friday, July 10 an Acton youth was arrested having \$200 worth of narcotics in his possession.

It is easy to predict where most individuals will end up through narcotics use and what steps they will take to get there. The beginning experimentation, the psychological and physiological effects and the users' conduct are as easy to follow as a road map. What is not predictable is just how far the journey will go before the traveler turns down the dead-end street.

This was not the first arrest in the town and I don't think it will be the last of this nature. We would again urge the parents of the town to talk to your sons and daughters and find out if they are taking drugs and if they are, seek the proper help. It's available.

Sunday: Forgot I turned the frig off yesterday to defrost it and woke to a big pool of water all over the kitchen floor. That wouldn't have been that bad in itself, but the dogs had walked through it 20 or 30 times during the night. Wouldn't you know, after all our carefully laid plans for the dogs, Sue has come in season and will have to go to a kennel after all. Poor pup. Poor pocketbook.
