

Rams trim Braves right in suds city

Acton Rams came on like a house on fire in the third period, potting seven goals in the space of less than six minutes, to defeat Kitchener Braves 12-9 in Junior B lacrosse in the suds city Wednesday night.

The Rams, shorthanded and missing coach Dwyer for the first stanza, came from behind a 5-4 Brave edge with the powerful third period wallop after being on the receiving end of the lion's share of the penalties over the distance.

Coach Howard Dwyer felt the Rams played very well in chalking up the win although he had some sour words for the referees who pinned 15 penalties on his charges while the Braves received 11.

Dwyer was at a cottage in the Huntville area when rain washed out a culvert and it took some shuffling for him to make the game at all. Manager Allan Hall made the trip to Muskoka to rescue the coach and they arrived at the Kitchener auditorium in time to wave the baton for the second stanza.

Big gun for the Rams in this one was Gary Kelly. He scored five goals and assisted on another. Bob Turkoz netted a hat trick, George McPhail potted a pair and helped with two others with Mike Marcoux and Bob Andrews each hitting the score sheet once. Mike also got a bracket.

Assists were collected by Fred Flanik (2), Paul Cooper, Stu

McCullough and Bob Waller with goalkeeper Gary Turkoz contributing four which aided the team's cause most in the third period surge.

Although the outcome delighted coach Dwyer, he pointed out Kitchener took a marginal 10-9 decision from the Rams in their last appearance in Acton. It gave special delight to pin a loss on the Braves in their own teepee.

The Rams have only two scheduled games left in the Junior B league—at Niagara Saturday and in Oakville next Tuesday. Then they'll be ready for playoffs in their own category—Junior C.

First team they meet will most likely be Midland but dates for the series are still not settled.
