Ronald Malcolm and Peter Puchyr of Acton are among the more than 1,500 entrants in the United States National Model Airplane Championships who registered at the naval air station in Glenview, Illinois. The meet, often referred to as the world series of model aviation, runs from Monday, July 27 to August 2.

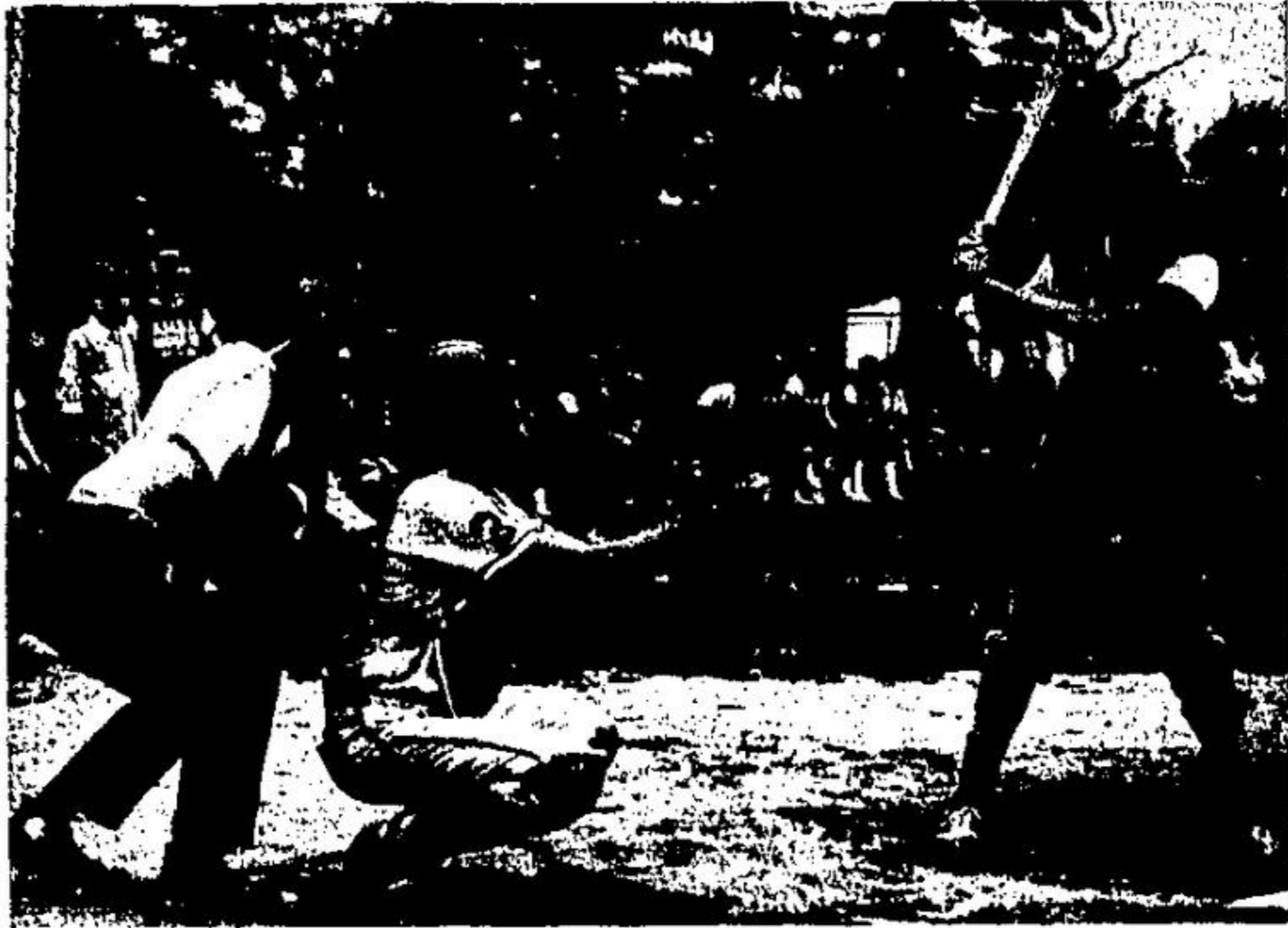
Salmon whiffed 13 Acton batters as he pitched a crisp two hitter allowing only one batter to make it to second.
