## Kanaka, canine cop hangs up his badge

Kanaka, the seven year-old German Shepherd dog purchased by the Ontario Provincial Police for a canine corps in 1965 has hung up his badge. He comes from Laura Tremble's Tanhardt Kennels at Silvercreek, between Acton and Georgetown.

After training at Maryland State College, Kanaka and his handler, Corporal Al Boley went into service in January, 1966. Since then the pair have rescued or helped in the arrest of 150


