

Rams open tonight game two Monday

Coach Howard Dwyer expects to have a full team in uniform, when his junior boxla Rams travel to Midland tonight (Wednesday), for the opening game of the best of five O.L.A. junior "C" semi-finals against Midland Hurons.

Fred Barens, Bob Roughley and Fred Filnik, all of whom suffered injuries in the rugged regular season Western division finale against Oakville, have been working out with the team and have been given the go ahead to dress for the game.

Rod McEachern, who has looked impressive replacing Gary Turkosz in goal recently, will get the starting nod between the pipes. Turkosz provides a more than adequate back-up man. It was his fine play that kept Rams in several games, earlier in the season.

Hurons chief problem will undoubtedly lay in keeping Rams' top two marksmen Bob Turkosz and Mike Marcoux in check. The duo accounted for 226 of the 248 Acton goals this season. Turkosz netted an amazing 65 goals in 23 games, while Marcoux fired 48 in 24 games, an average of two per game.

Coach Dwyer and manager Alan Hall scouted Hurons in a recent central division league game in Scarboro and are confident their lads can sideline the Georgian Bay crew and advance to the Ontario finals against the winner of the Scarboro-Windsor series.

The series resumes in the local community centre, Monday night at 8.30, then returns to Midland for game three Wednesday August 19.

Bob Turkosz top Acton Ram scorer

Team captain Bob Turkosz scored 65 goals and collected 29 assists during the regular O.L.A. Western division junior "B" league, to reign as Acton Rams' 1970 scoring champ. "Turk" also led Acton Indusmin juveniles in scoring, last season.

Although league statistics have not been officially released, it is expected the Ram sharpshooter finished in the league's top 10 scorers.

Mike Marcoux, who along with Craig Weldon was the only Ram player to play in all 24 league games, finished second in the Acton point parade with 48 goals and 15 assists for 63 points.

Playing in only 17 league games, Gary Kelley placed third with 26 goals and 21 assists for 47 points.
