#### New building at Terra Cotta

Construction of a concession and changehouse building at the Terra Cotta Conservation Area is expected to start next week.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority has awarded a contract to West-Lake Construction Ltd. which submitted a low bid of \$60,000.

A separate contract to construct the septic tank and disposal field serving the new building has been awarded to the same company for \$9,900.

The building, which will overlook the swimming pond at the Terra Cotta area, will have about 2,500 square feet of floor space. A large concession booth will be located at one end of the building, together with kitchen and storage facilities.

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# Ban bar, booze decision to be reconsidered

A joint meeting between the Chamber of Commerce and representatives of the service clubs planning a special sportsmen's labor day weekend asked the Board of Parks Management to reconsider a decision they made last week to ben a bar for the Saturday night dance at the arena. The Board will make a

decision Wednesday night. Service club representatives assured Parks Board members they had no intention of allowing teenagers access to the bar which will be operated by the Y's Men's Gub as one part of their contribution to the big weekend. A dance murathon plan has been abandoned because of Parks Board's attitude.

A plan to by-pass Georgetown with Highway 7 in ten years' time took definite form last week when an agreement was signed between the province and the municipality.

The by-pass, which will be under a planning study to include land and construction costs, will measure 7.2 miles in length, two miles of which are within the town. Balance of the by-pass will be in Esquesing township.

It would run from the present intersection of Highway 7 with the Streetsville Road east of the town to the junction of Highway 7 and the 7th Line on the west side of Georgetown.

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
