New building at Terra Cotta

Construction of a concession and changehouse building at the Terra Cotta Conservation Area is expected to start next week.
The Credit Valley Conservation Authority has awarded a contract to West-Lake Construction Ltd., which submitted a low bid of \$60,000.
A separate contract to construct the septic tank and disposal field serving the new building has been awarded to the same company for \$9,900.
The building, which will overlook the swimming pond at the Terra Cotta area, will have about 2,500 square feet of floor space. A large concession booth will be located at one end of the building, together with kitchen and storage facilities.

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Ban bar, booze decision to be reconsidered

A joint meeting between the Chamber of Commerce and representatives of the service clubs planning a special sportsmen's labor day weekend asked the Board of Parks Management to reconsider a decision they made last week to ban a bar for the Saturday night dance at the arena. The Board will make a decision Wednesday night.
Service club representatives assured Parks Board members they had no intention of allowing teenagers access to the bar which will be operated by the Y's Men's Club as one part of their contribution to the big weekend. A dance marathon plan has been abandoned because of Parks Board's attitude.

A liquor permit has already been issued for the dance.
Chamber of Commerce president John Shadbolt took exception to "behind our backs" charges made at the regular Parks Board meeting last Thursday. "They are not true," he told the meeting.
Deploras Confusion
He deploras the confusion of the Board over the show. "The Chamber has done everything to let the Board know what was going on," he said. "A phone call to any member of the committee the night of the meeting would have secured the required information."
Representatives assured the

Parks Board members the dance would be an all-adult affair.
Parks Board turned down the bar at their meeting after a heated exchange between chairman Peter Marks and member Art Gordon in which Mr. Gordon charged the sponsors of the sportsmen's show had never asked for use of the arena Saturday night. He also objected to use of the arena by the clubs for a nominal sum. "We can't operate the arena free," he told the Board.
The Board later voted to charge \$25 for use of the arena Saturday and Sunday with five per cent of the gate for the Sunday show.
Mr. Marks said the idea was to let the joint service clubs make some money which they would pump back into the community and assure an annual show for the Labor Day weekend. He admitted perhaps Parks Board did not have all the information on the show available but attributed it to oversight.
Mr. Gordon insisted any dance must be cut off at 11.45 to which the chairman facetiously remarked he had seen drunks dance out of hotels at 3 a.m.

supplying dishes and other essentials for a bar permit.
Mr. Gordon insisted there would be no liquor permit granted anyway, which drew a retort from arena manager Harold Townsley that he had received a permit in the mall the previous day.
Mr. Gordon deploras the take for granted attitude of the show sponsors charging there was no excuse for oversights like a formal request for the arena.
"They went ahead and made arrangements, permit and all, without asking us," he said.
Stormy weather
The chairman took exception to the inference that organizers had

gone behind the board's backs to make plans. Mr. Gordon reacted strongly, charging the chairman was putting words in his mouth.
Peacemaker for the stormy session was Councillor Orv Chapman who asked what was gained by sitting arguing for hours over what the clubs were going to do. He urged a meeting with them to find out plans.
There was general agreement this was a sound idea but it was decided a stand should be taken on the idea of a bar. "Where minors are concerned, we can't take chances," the chairman said.
A show of hands unanimously opposed the bar idea.

Plan highway pass

A plan to by-pass Georgetown with Highway 7 in ten years' time took definite form last week when an agreement was signed between the province and the municipality.

The by-pass, which will be under a planning study to include land and construction costs, will measure 7.2 miles in length, two miles of which are within the town. Balance of the by-pass will be in Esqueving township.

It would run from the present intersection of Highway 7 with the Streetsville Road east of the town to the junction of Highway 7 and the 7th Line on the west side of Georgetown.
The route would proceed from the west side along the 7th Line, angle behind Georgetown

hospital, cross Maple Avenue near the North Halton golf course, cross Main St. S. near the Stewarttown sideroad, angle down to the Ashgrove sideroad and sweep south of Norval towards Highway 7 and the Streetsville Road intersection.
Lions share of lands acquired within the town limits for the highway right-of-way will be paid for by the province which will contribute 90 per cent. Town cost would be 10 per cent.
The initial plan was to split costs equally but the town road chairman claimed credit along with the town engineer for negotiating the 90-10 split.
Georgetown council voted for the agreement 5-2. Mayor Emmons and Reve Hunter opposed.
