Acton Rams spotted Midland Hurons a 4-3 first period lead, then bounced back to outscore their hosts 7-4 in the second period and bring home a 19-14 victory in the first game of the best of five O.L.A. Junior "C" semi-finals in the Georgian Bay town, last Wednesday night.

A busload of local supporters cheered Rams to the come from behind win against the hustling Hurons, who Acton coach Howard Dwyer compared to Kitchener Braves of the Western division, in which Rams played during the regular season.

Huron goalie great Midland goalie Cooke played spectacularly in the first half of the game, but Ram rookie Chris Sargent beat the Huron netminder with one of his famous "lob" shots midway through the second frame to tie the score 8-8
