Exorbitant prices affect postal demands

The Editor, Acton Free Press Dear Sir: May I speak for one moment about both the inequality and the inequity of prices? After all, Canada is supposed to be a free country, and I have as much right to make fair-minded statements, as strikers have to strike, or as anyone has to choose his own religion in this so-called free land. I have no antipathy whatsoever against any group of Canadians, and it is very un-Canadian to subject anyone to incivility because of the stand he has taken. Real British-Canadians, yes, and French Canadian citizens, too, don't do that kind of thing. I maintain that rural and village working-men have their rights as well as the city men. The rural postal couriers have to supply a car to make their mail deliveries, and at a much lower rate of pay than their brother postmen in the city. How they would jump at the chance to accept that 46 cent an hour raise which our government is offering, but which the city postmen seem to be rejecting. We realize that the strikers are asking too much, but when they pay 32 cents for a loaf of cracked wheat bread, and the best part of a dollar for a pound of butter, we also realize that they are up against unwarranted exorbitant prices, while Canadian wheat is begging for buyers. It could be said that communications are the minus factor in the issue of the proposed water and sewage plant installation slated for Rockwood sometime in 1970. Although those in the know feel that there is only a 50-50 split attitude of the village residents, there are others who have mingled and found that the majority of taxpayers living here are concerned and want to know why they do not have any say in a matter which is hitting them right where it hurts most—their pocketbook. As has been reiterated by many villagers, "Why should we have to feel that it's being pushed down our throats?" Oddly enough any queries on the subject seem to incite an attitude of suspicion and, rather than being informed of the facts one has the feeling that no one knows them or that, if they do they can't tell. On the other hand if one does ask a straight out and out question as to what reasons necessitate the exorbitant costs of the project and how necessary is the new sewer hook-up, it's almost as if one is being a traitor to one's fellow man and want to curtail his having the same rights to drink pure water as everyone else. Well this is not the case. Most people are genuinely concerned about their neighbors and friends and would gladly do anything possible to alleviate difficult situations. The one thing they do insist on, though, is communication and if Clive Beardwood, one of the Wellington County health inspectors with the required technological know how could have been at the April 30th public meeting to talk to the public in layman's language there might never have been such a problem of communication. Alterations to the Bank of Montreal's Acton branch are now complete and residents will have a chance to see the renovated office at an "open house" this Friday afternoon, August 21. Manager Ted Pratt said the reception will be held between 2 and 6 o'clock. The bank project included adding nearly 650 square feet of floor space to the branch. There is a new counterline, with six tellers' wickets instead of five. There are two private coupon booths, a steel-and-reinforced-concrete vault, and new fireproof storage. There is also an "around-the-clock" depository unit. The redecorated, air-conditioned interior has a white and gold colour scheme. The Acton B of M office was established in 1900 and has been at its present location since 1957.
