# Rams sideline Hurons advance to Ont. finals

**First period scorers**

**Dwyer ejected**  
Upset by questionable calls by the referees, coach Howard Dwyer was ejected from the game for voicing his disapproval and manager Alan Hall handled the team for the rest of the game. Paul Cooper and Mike Marcoux netted the second period Acton goals, while Hook and Warzecha replied for Midland.

**Solid goaltending**  
Hurons stuck to lacrosse in the final 20 minutes, and just about

pulled the game out of the fire, but solid goaltending by Gary Turkosz saved the game for Acton.

Wright scored twice and Rutlyge and Lamb once each for Midland in the third period.

Mike Marcoux scored his second of the game for Acton.

**Ready for Scarboro**  
"We're happy, up and ready for Scarboro," coach Dwyer commented, after the game. Scarboro will supply the opposition for Rams in the Ontario finals.

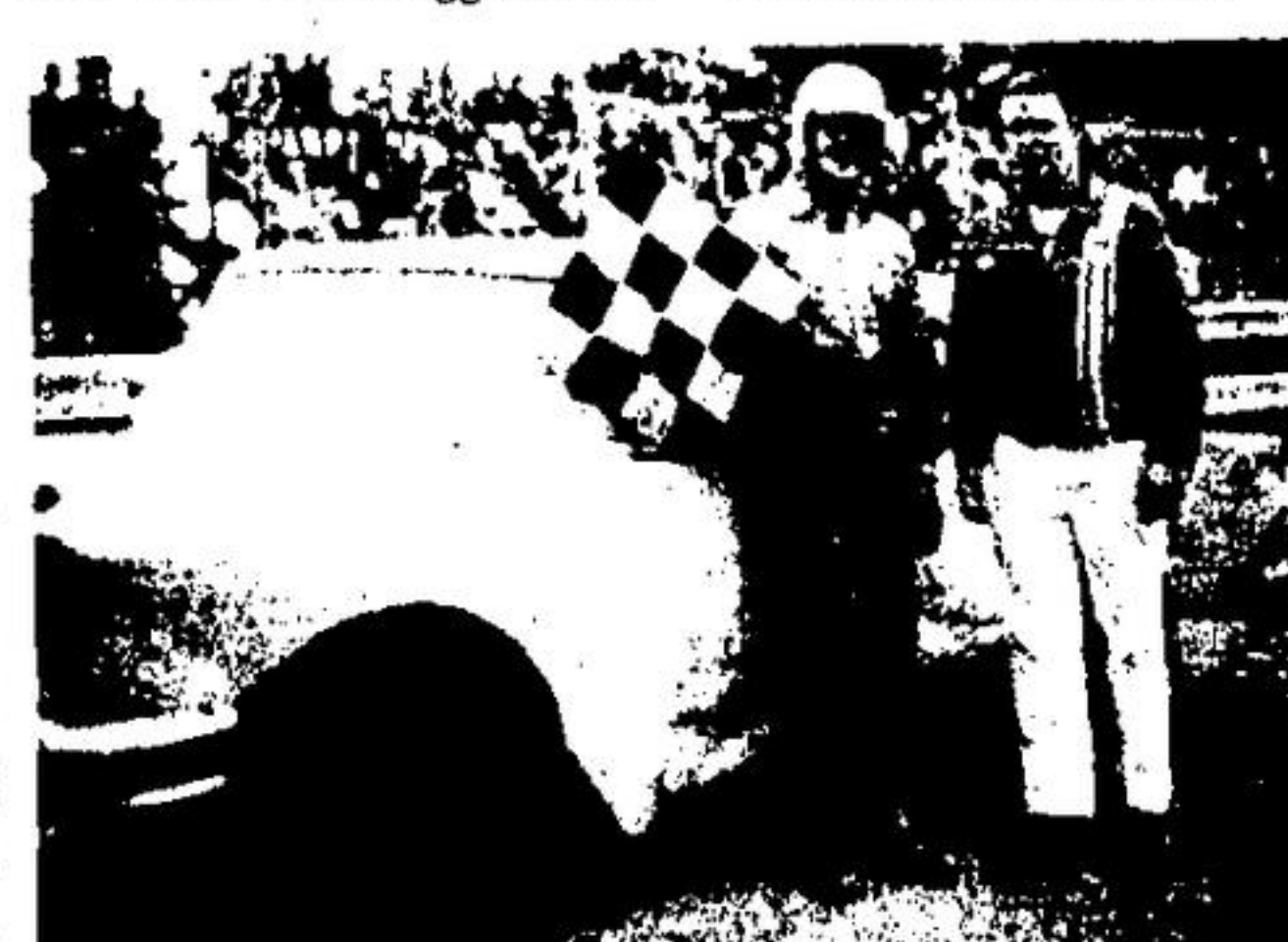
Then George Wrigglesworth started pushing but just could not get past. So, Larry Cox took his first feature with George Wrigglesworth second and Larry Majury third.
