A telegram was read from Sweden where Mr. and Mrs. Hugo Olson are vacationing.

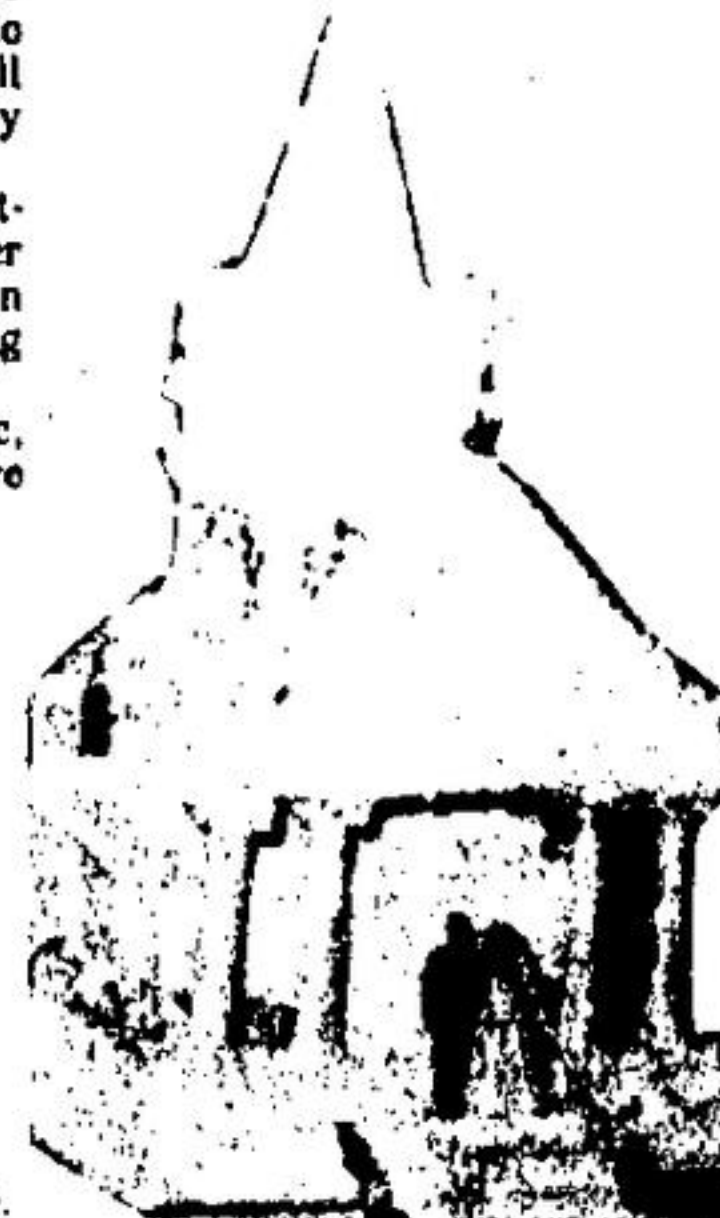
Wedding photos were taken by a long time family friend, Alfred Baumann, St. Catharines.

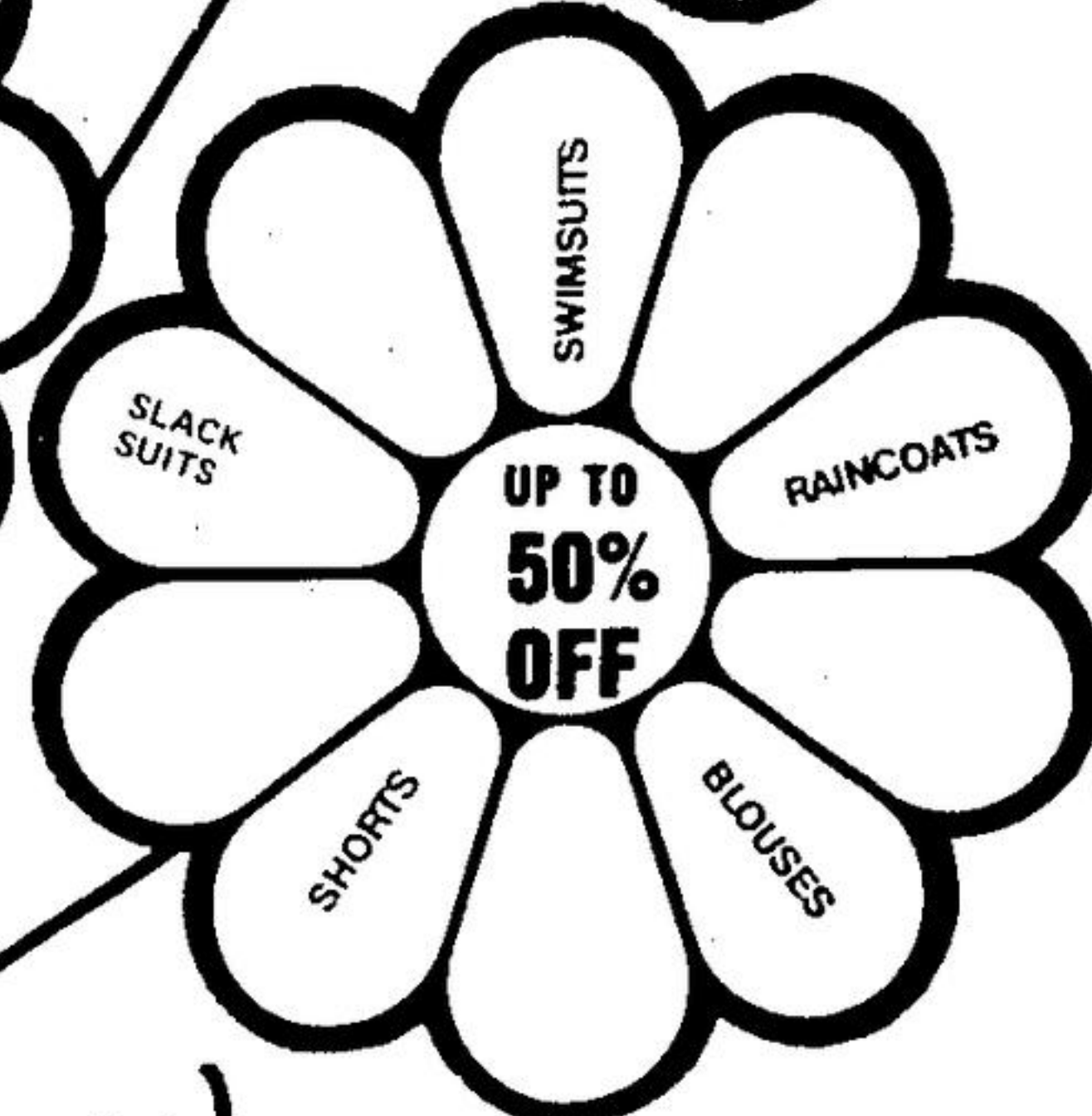
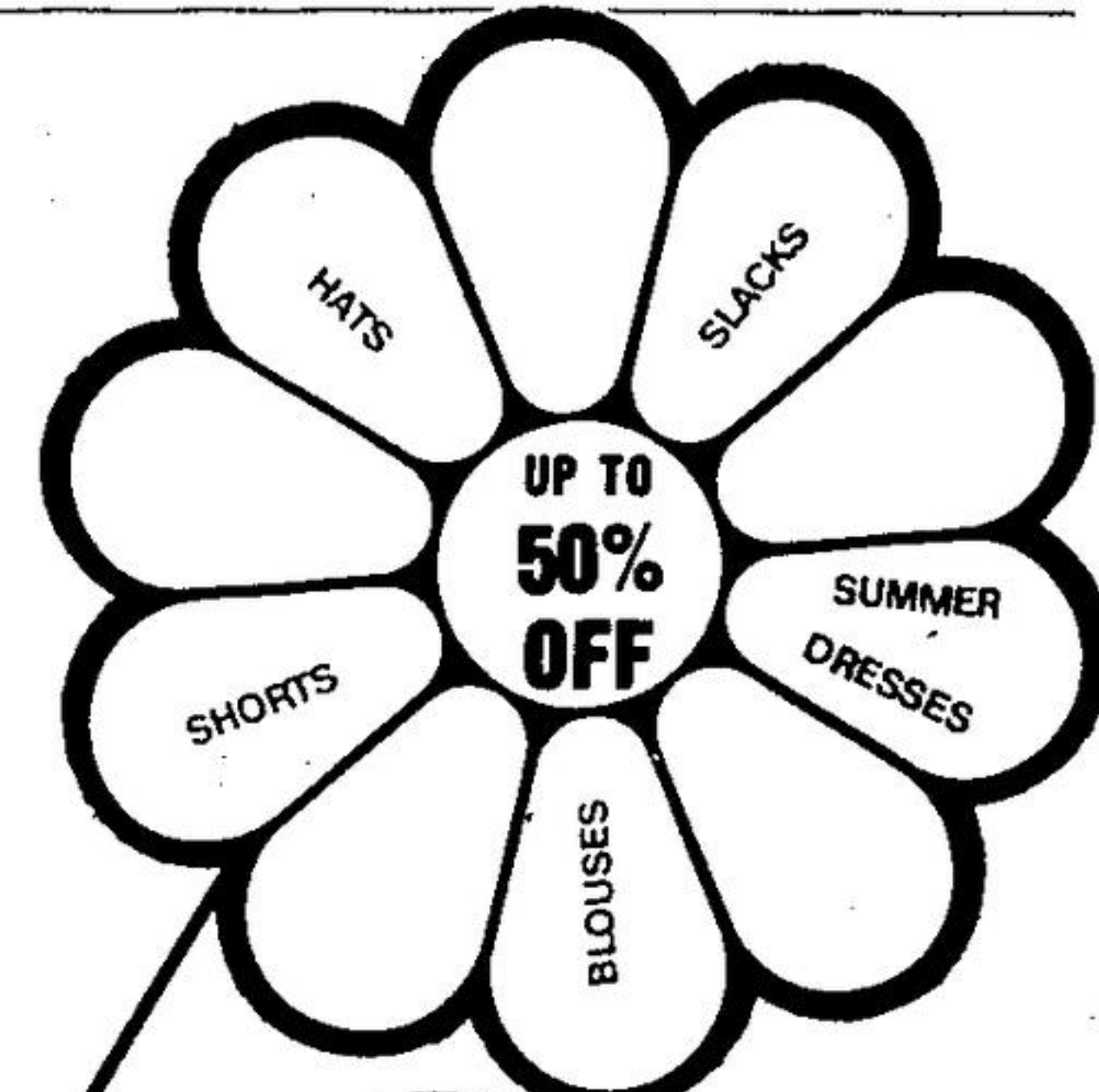
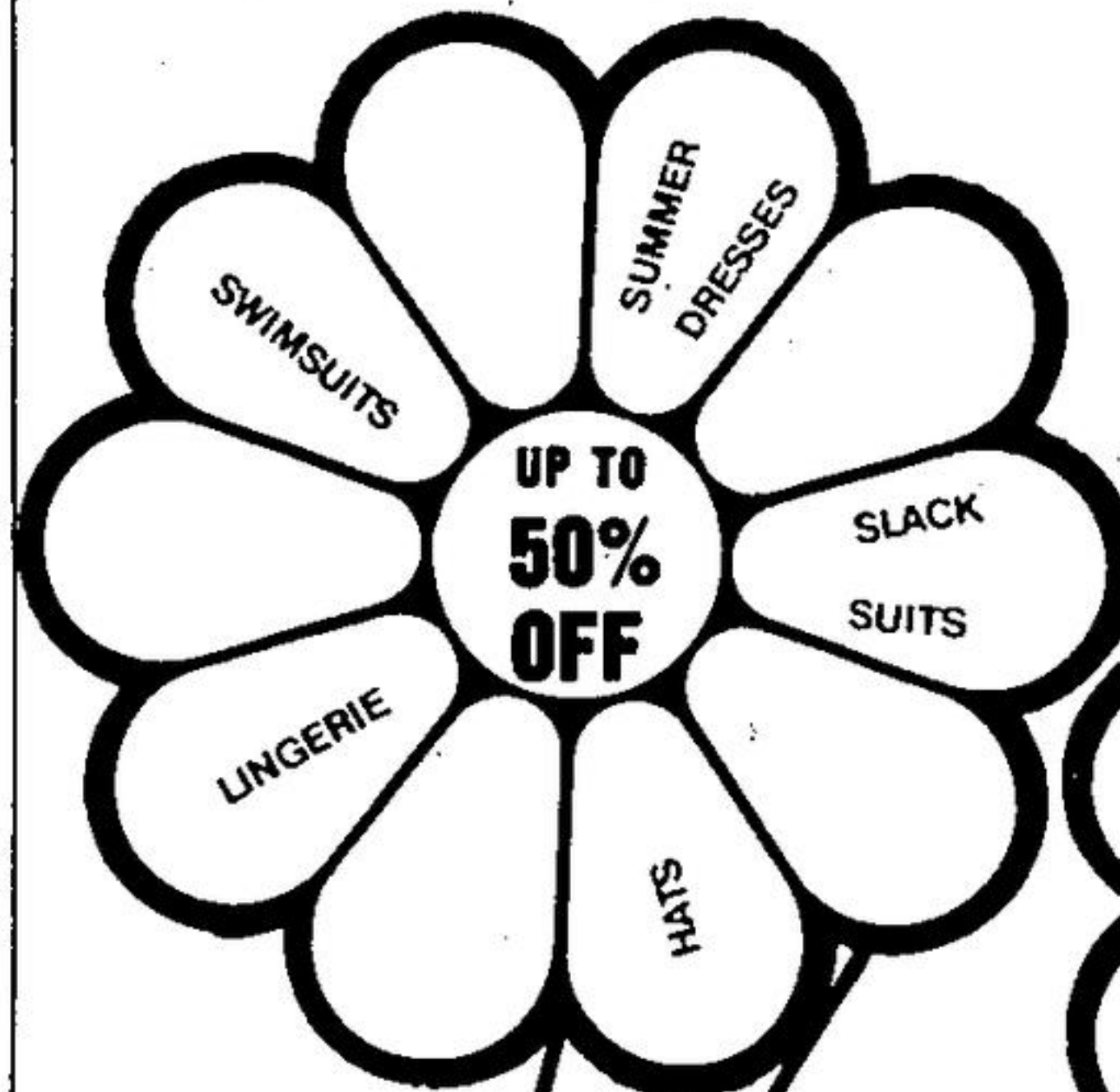
