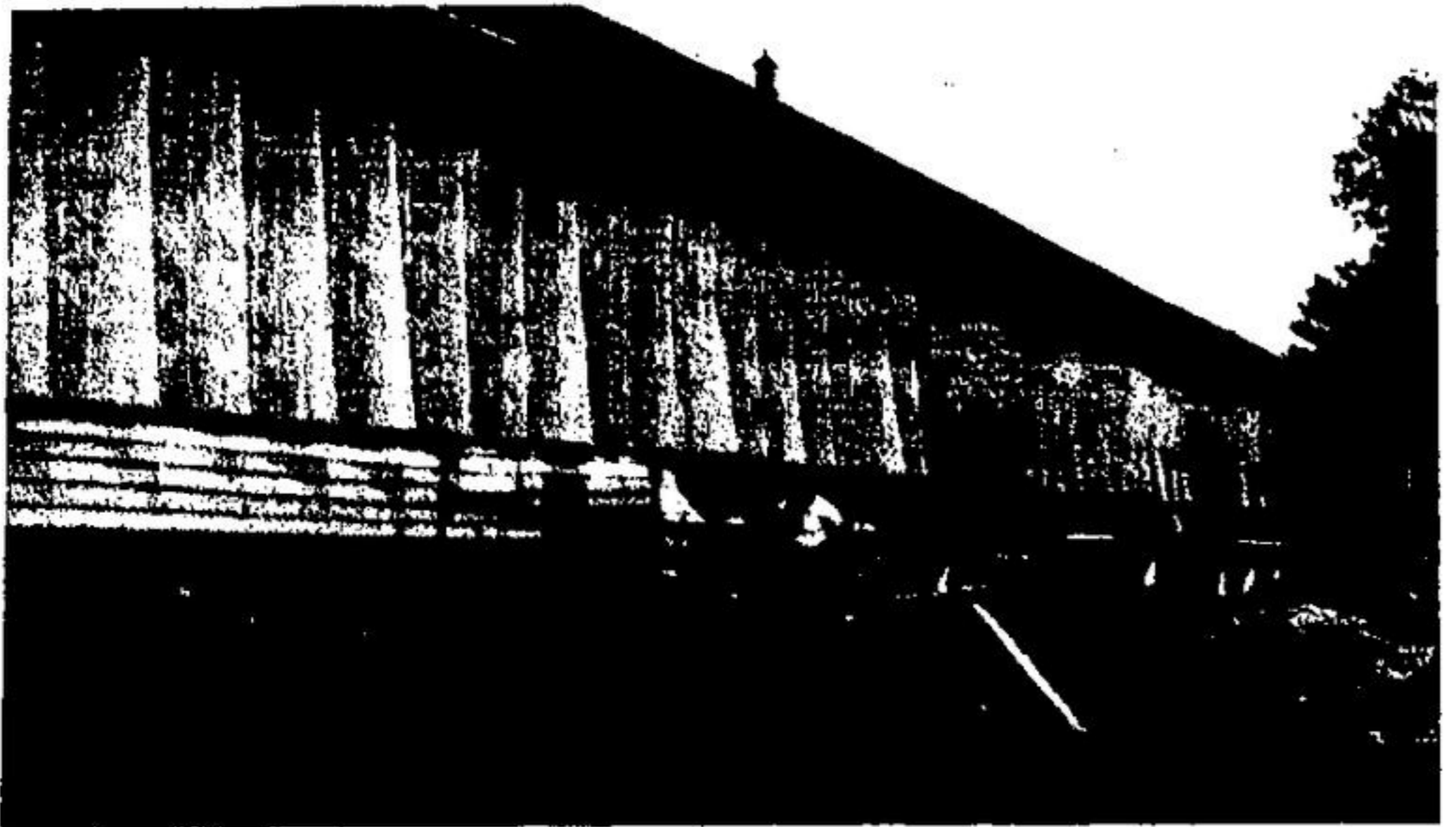

## Esquesing approves site Peel outdoor classroom

Esquesing Council has approved issue of a building permit to Peel County Board of Education for a building to house washroom facilities and office

space, in connection with an outdoor classroom on Lot 31, Concession 11.  
A letter from the township planning consultant read at Monday night's meeting assured council there would be no conflict in the proposed use and future planning in the area.  
However, reeve George Currie made it clear the building would be assessed.  
"We have tax free land for our own educational purposes in Halton, we shouldn't have to support Peel's" councillor Ken Marshall emphasized.  
The 720 square foot building was built by one of Peel's secondary school shops and will be shipped to the site.  
Students will be transported to the outdoor classroom on a daily basis.  
Courses in field study will be operated at the property next term in almost virgin wilderness, north of Terra Cotta Conservation park.  
Councillor Marshall, a consistent critic of money spent by boards of education had criticized the program at a previous meeting, claiming it was just another waste of taxpayers' money.
