Two years later he attended the school for three weeks and received a diploma, meanwhile practicing on the chant, which he says, is strictly up to the budding auctioneer to learn on his own.

His first blg break in the auctioneering business came in 1965 when a friend, Art Nightingale of Rockwood, asked him to look after auctioning off his parents' estate.

It was a year before he got his second sale, the farm of John Anscomb, a man he met working

While he washed he chanted the at a feed mill. The sale grossed becoming well known.

Last year Chris Schouten officiated at 60 sales, the longest of which took seven and a half hours. He gives credit to Frank Petch who taught him English and Jack Elliott, a retired auctioneer, for helping along the

road to auctioneering success. There is much more work involved in an auction than most people realize, Schouten says.

doctors as offices. The unit has 12,000 square feet of the medical centre, compared to the 4,000 feet of space in the


